VOLUNTEERS

We are so grateful for the volunteer teams that have come to help us during 2017. WWAM with the extraordinary Bill Clink overseeing, did an excellent job helping to get our grounds cleaned for spring and then they returned to help with the grounds and the set up for our Annual Summer Social and Victorian Open House.

Approximately 20 Oakland University students volunteered for their Day of Difference in October. They split into two groups to help our regular volunteers scan documents or rake leaves. We always enjoy the OU students; they did an amazing job volunteering. In just a few hours we can accomplish more than we could in several days.

This year we had a volunteer group from GM Global Propulsion Systems come to help us. They made repairs on the schoolhouse ramp which were desperately needed and painted the entry way into the Carriage House. They raised the driveway entrance sign so it can now be seen when approaching Pine Grove. Shelves and hooks were added in the storage sheds for better organization.

Along with our Volunteer Teams we had over 50 individual volunteers who logged over 4,100 hours in 2017. Bruce installed a control device on the furnace so that air can travel through the heat vents to help with air flow throughout the Mansion. He wired the air conditioner (donated by Charlotte Cooper) outside of the house for safety. It helped greatly to cool the Mansion.

The curtains and window in the Green Room were cleaned by Jane Karaguleff (House Committee) and glass on the cabinets was washed. For this event, the room had children's

items on display in cabinets and clothing hung on wooden display holders that were made for an Eagle Scout project. Finally, Sue set up the dining room table display with a third set of dishes with leaves on them.

PUBLICATION DEVELOPMENT

The 2018 calendar entitled "OCPHS Remembers 1918" includes pictures and posters that were part of Pontiac community during WWI. These images of Pontiac soldiers and people were assembled by **Geoff Brieger** and **Dave Walls**, and have been popular with the 100 year anniversary of WWI. It was available at the 2017 Summer Social, which gave it much needed early publicity.

This year we also had a new publication for our members and friends. *Soup to Nuts: New Takes on Old Favorites*. This excellent cook book was edited by **Jo Pate**. This book is a collection of recipes submitted by members of OCPHS, as well as non-members who are interested in cooking. Some of the dishes were taste-tested before inclusion because they were, well, unusual. Jo found a few volunteers to be her taste-testers who wholeheartedly approved the recipes for inclusion.

Plans and Accomplishments

In terms of activity, 2017 was a planning year, with some exceptions. Without much of a budget, we really couldn't get very far, and focused on setting the stage for better things in the future. Even so, it was a productive year. Most importantly, there's a roadmap in place to implement over time.

Website

The website was completely replaced with a WordPress engine. This lets us easily update and manage it, and more importantly, it lets us track *metrics* – what people are viewing on the site. The new site also integrates donations and an online store, smoothes out the process of getting payments from Paypal, and lets people can find things they're looking for more easily. It also handles mobile devices like tablets and phones well.

As a result, website traffic increased from around 400 users per month to around 3,200 – we're not google.com, but that's an outstanding increase. Our donation system processed around \$2,700 in donations from June through December, averaging around \$240.00 per month. Again, not a huge number – but the future looks bright.

Google for Non-Profits

Since around the mid-1990s, OCPHS has relied on board members and volunteers to use their home computers to manage data for the Society, specifically email and work in progress. We also rely on people to make sure correspondence ends up back at OCPHS in some way, which hasn't been a priority. As a result, OCPHS lacks a document trail and central storage for these documents and data.

To begin to correct this, OCPHS implemented the "Google Suite for Non-Profits", aka "the G Suite", which is free as part of Google's efforts in the non-profit market.

This is groupware – it gives us online storage and email, which lets us centrally manage and store information that otherwise would be stored on a user's computer.

Through it, we can assign email addresses from the pinegrovewisner.org domain – email sent and received under those email addresses is stored under the organization's umbrella, and can serve as the Society's email "letterhead". This is an important step toward recreating that lost document trail.

Implementation of the G-Suite has been slow. Resistance is high. With time, this will improve; as knowledge and need arises, more of its features will come into use.

GROUNDS AND MAINTENANCE

Pine Grove is a beautiful five acres. When you drive onto the grounds, it is easy to quickly forget that you are still in a city. However, as beautiful as Pine Grove is, it is in a constant state of needing repairs and upgrades. This year the most notable upgrade was to the Carriage House, which received new paint, carpet and kitchen cabinets. It was a drastic change to the previous 1990s decor. Since so much of our daily operations are done in the Carriage House this has been a noticeable and welcome change.

The trim on the Wisner House got a new coat of paint as did the entire schoolhouse. The GM Global Propulsion Systems group repaired the schoolhouse ramp. The main Pine Grove sign on the front lawn and the entrance sign were painted and raised white to help draw attention.

PROJECTS COMPLETED:

The Décor Custom Painting Company helped restore the Green Room (Pantry), and some window trim and Door trim, on the outside of the HOUSE and the Gift Shop. The wooden storm doors and two French Sash storm window doors for the gift shop were restored and painted. The wrap around exterior porch floor was repainted. The SUMMER KITCHEN had two doors and casings restored and window boards by Décor Custom Painting Company. They also painted the SCHOOL HOUSE siding, trim and front porch.

PROJECTS UNDERWAY AND BEING EVALUATED:

A lot has been accomplished this year, but there is more that is needed to be done. The Wisner House needs CLIMATE CONTROL to stabilize the interior environment. At that time, one Gas and one Electric Meter could replace the two each we have now. This would save dollars yearly. Quotes are being solicited. The windows are very old and fragile and can crack easily with movement. The storm windows need caulking and some need repair or replacement. A plan and costs are in the works. New wall cracks have developed in the upstairs rooms and the office ... costs are being solicited. Exterior doors need sealing and repair...costs are being solicited. Some Exterior bricks are in need of tuckpointing...costs are being solicited.

House upkeep and maintenance will continue. The foundation will continue to be monitored. An action plan and costs will be presented to the board for review and approval.

LIBRARY

The Library specializes in the history of Oakland County. This includes family histories, abstracts and deeds, advertisements, art posters, cemetery records, directories, books, maps, manuscripts, military inventories, newspapers 1856+, oversized photos, plat maps, posters, railroad and road maps, school diplomas and yearbooks, scrapbooks, street guides, and township maps 1817+.

Pat Kaltwasser and Terry Currin are reorganizing the library by the Dewey Decimal System and creating a computer database. Terry has put in hundreds of volunteer hours to get this project nearly to completion. We cannot thank him enough. The result will make it easier to find reference material. Pat continues to index the names in the scrapbooks to compile a searchable database, and Reida Gardiner enters the information into a searchable index.

Volunteers drop what they are doing to assist visitors who come in to do research, which has resulted in new memberships, donations, and exchange of information. If **YOU** wish to help with library/archive projects, any size, any time, please contact the office. Your help is always appreciated!

ACCESSIONS

The most interesting donation this year was the collection of Civil War memorabilia from the estate of Charles A. Nisbett, donated by his grandson Donald S. Nisbett. The major items included an approximately 9'x4' national flag, dating from 1862-63, identified as a recruiting flag, a collection of letters from prominent persons of the time, including President Rutherford B. Hayes and General W.T. Sherman, a certificate honoring members of the Michigan 16th Volunteer Infantry Regiment, who had fought in 38 major battles of the Civil War, and a collection of ribbons and medallions issued to participants in annual Reunions of the G.A.R. as well as the 16th Regiment. Charles Nisbett was an active member and eventually president of the Michigan 16th Regiment, and eventually its president. The records of the reunions from 1909-1924 were also donated.

Accessions for 2017 were modest, and no particular category was favored. The bulk of the donations consisted of photos. Ten black and white photos and images were donated by Ray Lucas, Dot laLone, Leslie Pielack, Kathleen McDonald, and Jacques Caussin. Ten books, pamphlets, and booklets were donated by Pat Kaltwasser and John Scholl. Two maps were donated by Kathleen McDonald Nine artifacts were donated by Bill Clink, Ray Steehler, and Don McLain. Two miscellaneous items were donated by Helen McAllister and Dave DeLong.
