



#### ARMS BROTHERS CLOTHING STORE TO BE HONORED AT SOCIAL

In 1837, the Arms Brothers Men's Clothing store opened its doors for business in Milford. Today, this family is still in the same business.

Under the direction of T. R. Arms, Jr., this is one of the two oldest clothing stores in the United States, and is located at 361 N. Main Street.

On the afternoon of August 6, at the Ice Cream Social, the festivities will pause to honor this 141 year old Oakland County business.

The Oakland County Pioneer & Historical Society will present a plaque to this thriving concern which is as old as the state itself.

#### A DAY TO REMEMBER .....

..... TIMES PAST



Ezra Jewell, Society Officer

Ezra Jewell, an early member of the Pioneer Society, was an important person in preserving the records and biographies of Oakland County's settlers.

Born in Ithaca, New York, he came to Michigan with his parents in 1836 at the age of three. The family moved to Pontiac when Ezra was twelve. The boy learned the bakery business. He moved on to buying and selling furs in the county during a time when the forests that closed in on the villages had wolves and fox in abundance.

In the restless wave of the young men of early 1850's, Ezra spent three years searching out gold in California.

Perhaps because his own life was so varied and colorful, he took an unusual interest in collecting the biographies of other early settlers. With a steel pen and a lot of patience, he carefully indexed these scrapbooks of pioneer courage.

These books occupy an important place on the shelves

of the research library at Pine Grove.

Ezra started the collection of artifacts that were stored for many years in the courthouse. And it was he who personally asked the county board of supervisors to make a yearly appropriation for the pioneer association.

He served in 1896 as secretary, gathering records that had never been kept before. From 1909 to 1912, he was president of the Pioneer Society.

#### MORE ABOUT THE SOCIAL

There will be something for everyone's interest at the Ice Cream Social August 6. The Pot Pourri Shoppe will be open at its usual stand in the house, and a second shoppe will be set up on the lawn. There will be many new and different books and old maps. Handcrafted items will be very welcome.

The Book Appraisal Booth affords a rare opportunity to have appraised those doubtful, dusty old volumes

that just might be very valuable. Jim Babcock will give an appraisal for only \$1.00 per document, letter or book. Keenly interested in many branches of history Jim is a past president of the Michigan Historical Society and was on the Commission for the Michigan Civil War Centennial Observance. He served for eleven years as chief librarian of the Burton Historical Collection of the Detroit Public Library. Bundle up your old books and papers and bring them along Sunday, August 6.

Our Quilting Guild has been gifted with a 45 year old hand made quilt top. It is in the See-Saw pattern. This will be on the frames by August 6. Tickets for the See-Saw quilt are now on sale, and the drawing will be held at the Victorian Open House this December.

On August 6, Mrs. Louise Merrill of Fenton will be presented with the quilt she won at last year's Victorian Open House. This was one of the largest quilts made so far and is of blocks representing 30 states.
