
youngest Governor, 1835-1839.

Milford Cemetery Vault To Be

Dedicated May 26th

On May 26th, during Milford's Memorial Day celebration, the American Legion will meet at Oak Grove Cemetery at 12:00 noon to honor over 100 Civil War veterans from the Milford area buried there and to dedicate the newly restored 1885 vault. The cemetery was first dedicated in 1845 and is listed on the Michigan Register of Historic Sites.



When the Carriage House was re-constructed at "Pine Grove", the Governor Moses Wisner Historic House, as our United States Bicentennial project, back in 1976, the necessary funds were not then available to build the stonework facade and cover the concrete foundation wall.

Now, 10 years later in 1986, we are hoping to get the work done during our Michigan Sesquicentennial celebration.

It is estimated that 1700 stones will be needed to complete the foundation project. To enable us to purchase these stones and have them laid, we are asking our members and friends to contribute toward one or more stones at \$5.00 each. All contributions are, of course, tax-deductible.

LET'S GET THE \$\$\$'\$ TO GET THE JOB DONE

THE REBELS are on the move. After a year and a half of defensive fighting Gen. Robert E. Lee has moved his forces northward in a grand plan to "shift the burden of occupation from Confererate to Federal soil," a plan that ultimately would take him as far north as Gettysburg.

And so in September of 1862 Lee and his generals are confident. On his way to join his commander after another smashing success at Harpers Ferry, Lee's chief subordinate, Stonewall Jackson, pauses to let his men relax near a peaceful white church by a river called the Antietam. He does not expect a counter-attack. It comes with withering fury from troops under "Fighting Joe" Hooker who rake Jackson's men with cannister shot.

As the smoke of battle lifts temporarily, an ungainly wagon draped in black lumbers onto the blood-drenched field. At the reins is a slight man in a broadcloth suit and linen duster, attire as strange among the blue-clad troops as was the odd vehicle, which Hooker's men have laughingly dubbed the "What-is-it" wagon.

The driver is Mathew B. Brady, known among the rich and titled of two continents, whose portraits line his New York galleries, as the foremost practitioner of the infant art of photography.

Quickly now, even as Jackson's men regroup to fight again, even before the Confederate dead are recovered, Brady and his assistants, James and Alexander Gardner, haul out a cumbersome contraption, a camera, along with several

delicate glass plates. The plates have been coated, in the field, in total darkness, with a chemical mixture, then fixed, at precisely 60 degrees "to just the right degree of stickiness" in a bath of nitrate of silver.

Brady and his men expose the plates to the sunlit carnage. Before the plates fog over they rush them back to the wagon for developing — and back to an awed civilian populace for viewing.

The world gets a new insight into the horror of battle. Says Oliver Wendell Holmes: "Let him who wishes to know what war is look at these illustrations."

The 2nd Michigan Volunteer Infantry Regiment was recruited under the leadership of Major Israel Bush Richardson, a retired West Pointer, of Pontiac. "Fighting Dick" Richardson was killed in the Battle of Antietam leading a northern charge.
