IN MEMORIAM

Jean McGregor Milton died September 3, 2006

Jean Milton was well known in the community for her service to many public organizations. She had received several awards over the years, such as 1992 Citizen of Year Award, the 2004 Pontiac Unity Award for her work on the Planning Commission, and recognition for her work on the Oakland County Personnel Appeal Board. Her many activities included the Clinton River Watershed Council and Cleanup Committee, Civic Chair of the Pontiac Better Homes and Garden Club, Citizens Advisory Council of Clinton Valley Center, and many other organizations.

She had been a member of the Board of Directors of Oakland County Pioneer and Historical Society for over 10 years and Chairman of the Costume Committee for almost as long.

She is survived by her brother, George McGregor, of North Carolina.

WE STILL NEED GUIDES

The season is starting for school tours, and we are desperately in need of guides for these tours. We will train you and provide costumes. Training sessions are provided as are materials that help identify items in the house and schoolhouse. Sometimes the guides take groups through the entire house and schoolhouse; and, with children, teachers hold a classroom lesson in the manner of Victorian times. There is a switch on the teacher's desk and a dunce hat in the corner. Often we need stationary guides in the Wisner House, which means you are assigned to a particular area and will be expected to identify items in that area. We need people just keep a watch to see that items are not "borrowed" and no one gets hurt. There is no designated time commitment, but as tours are scheduled, guides are needed. Consider volunteering a few hours a month. Your help is desperately needed.

FROM THE NEWSPAPERS....

Democratic Standard, Coshocton, Ohio, August 14, 1891:

U.R. Lake, president of the national grange of the Patrons of Industry, was born at Phillips, Franklin county, Mo., in 1836. He taught school in New York state for several years and then began farming. He moved to Rose, Oakland county, Mich., in 1867, and bought the 180 acre farm upon which he is living. Mr. Lake was one of the original founders of the order and helped frame the constitution.

Daily Free Democrat, Milwaukee, Wisconsin, November 23, 1850:

W.L. Taylor has been arrested and lodged in jail on the charge of abducting a young girl, named Martha Ann Garrette, an adopted daughter of John Wright, an old resident of this city, but now a resident of Oakland county. The girl has not been found. She was about 12 years of age, small in statue (sic), light eyes, auburn hair; had on when abducted a homemade plaid dress; took with her an Oregon plaid dress. Information of her whereabouts is asked, by letter to Mr. Wright directed to the Detroit Post Office.

The Daily Press, Pontiac, Michigan, February 21, 1903:

George Rohr of Buffalo and Marietta Morgan of Independence were married February 12 at Detroit by Rev. A. Brown.

Learn to play the mandolin. 30 lessons and a fine rosewood mandolin for \$15. \$2. down, balance 50 cents weekly. For particulars inquire of W.E.VCan (sic) Riper, 78 south Saginaw street.

Ball Mountain: F. Hilton started to Pontiac in a wagon Wednesday but got stuck in a snow drift and was compelled to borrow bob sleighs in which to continue his journey.

The Pontiac Courier, May 2, 1836:

WANTED: By the subscriber residing in the town of Groveland, Oak. Co. about 8 miles north west of D. Stanard's tavern – a smart active boy, 13 to 16 years of age, to work on farm until he is of age. Terms will be found reasonable as to compensation, schooling, etc.

Alonzo R. Rood, of Groveland

WANTED: At the office of the Pontiac Courier, as an apprentice, to the printing business. An active 14 years of age, or thereabouts. To one well recommended as to moral character, etc., good encouragement will be given. Pontiac.


