# FOUR PLACES TO FIND LOCAL WWI VETERANS

The centennial of World War I is upon us, and I have located over 200 veterans who lived in Troy utilizing these main sources. Those wishing to do research on veterans in their own communities may find them helpful, and some are right here in our library.

- 1) 1930 Federal Census
  In the last two columns, individuals could
  indicate whether they were a veteran and,
  if so, of which war. The census can be
  accessed online at Ancestry.com
- 2) Local Cemeteries
  The Oakland County Genealogical Society
  houses lists of individuals buried in local
  cemeteries, including veterans. Most of
  these booklets can also be found at the
  OCPHS library. Online cemetery
  resources include Interment.net and
  Find A Grave.
- 3) "Records of Oakland County Soldiers and Sailors In the Service In the Great War"

The OCPHS library is the only place that houses all six volumes of this series.
The Archives of Michigan keeps copies on microfilm.

4) Organizations such as the American Legion and Veterans of Foreign Wars These organizations may have information on early members.

After months of intense planning, July 26<sup>th</sup> finally arrived. It turned out to be a beautiful day, both weather-wise and event-wise!

The event ran for six hours; we ended up with over 600 in attendance and made a profit of over \$6,000...an increase of about 150 attendees and \$2,000 from the year before.

At 11:30, our opening ceremony was led by veteran honor guards assisted by a Pontiac ROTC group. We had a number of distinguished guests who participated in the ceremony: Oakland County Executive L. Brooks Patterson; Mrs. Deirdre Waterman, Mayor of Pontiac; Mr. Ed Lee, local contractor; and Reverend Kent Clark, head of Grace Centers of Hope.

Every hour the Civil War cannon was fired and the whole area shook! Several Civil War soldiers roamed the grounds. The Sisters of the Union baked cookies in a cast iron dutch oven over a fire for guests to sample at their small encampment.

Children enjoyed making simple crafts and getting their faces painted. Spinning tops could also be made to order. At 4:00 a hardy group of kids had a ball learning how to drill with wooden rifles over their shoulders.

The Wisner Mansion was filled with dedicated docents, many in period costume. Lots of

guests wandered through the house and learned a good bit about 19<sup>th</sup> century living.

At 2:00 guests enjoyed an hour of presentations on the Wisner Mansion porch. We heard from Frederick Douglass, Abraham Lincoln and Mary Todd Lincoln. An actual Civil War letter from Private William C. Green was read.

Some serious learning took place in the schoolhouse. Mr. John Gibney, head of the Michigan Sesquicentennial Commission, passed along a wealth of information, particularly about Clara Barton. He was assisted by Tom Berlucchi, head of Historic Fort Wayne in Detroit (the only official Civil War site in Michigan). The schoolhouse was also the site of a quilt display and a photo/biographical exhibit of ten Civil War soldiers from Oakland County. At 3:30, former Pontiac mayor Willie Payne gave a fascinating slideshow presentation on the Underground Railroad in the Pontiac area.

As folks strolled the grounds, they saw the Oakland County Sheriff's mounted police horse and rider, tasted biscuits baked fresh at the summer kitchen, enjoyed ice cream and cake served by the Daughters of the American Revolution (DAR), partook of hot dogs and cold beverages, and visited with woodworkers, spinners, history authors and local historical societies.

#### 1901 CARRIAGE RETURNS HOME

113 years after its construction at Pontiac's Standard Vehicle Company, a cherished artifact from the early days of the automotive industry has come home. The carriage, built in 1901 not far down the Saginaw Trail from the Pine Grove estate, was generously donated to OCPHS by the Randy Hammons family of Clear Lake, Wisconsin. On September 15, Vice President Mike West and member Bob Sowles successfully navigated the Chicago-area traffic in Bob's truck and trailer to take delivery of the carriage. A small ceremony was held at the Hammons' Wisconsin farm.

OCPHS is excited about the future of our new acquisition, and it is our goal to honor the Hammons' request that it serve as an educational tool for the people of Pontiac. The carriage will be placed in a temporary climate-controlled facility pending restoration. We are beginning the search for funding sources to restore the artifact, which will include applying for a grant from the Motor Cities National Heritage Area. It will be utilized for visibility in parades and public events, and will be displayed at automotive-related facilities in the area. The carriage will also serve as the jumpingoff point for our much-anticipated Pontiac Automotive History Bus Tour, currently in the works. Watch for updates on this project in future newsletters, and ways in which you can be a part of our efforts!
