They came to America on coffin ships when their native land was devastated by the potato famine. These hardy folk made sacrifices of heroic stature and by working

together made the impossible happen. In hostile, desperate situations, they somehow found a way to survive. The traditional ballad "Green Grows the Laurel of Ireland" reminds me that, in the spirit of the Irish, there are no wimps at Wisner! "I LOVE A PARADE!"

That's how the old song goes, and I know most of us still do. This traditional summertime event in small-town America was fun for all, especially kids. It may have centered around a holiday, historical event or the circus coming through. I can still see the celluloid kewpie doll with pink and yellow feathers tied to the top of the long, pointy stick which my mother worried about me poking my eye out with! Dangerous, yes, but quite the prize for a ten-year old girl back in the 50's!

One of our area's best remnants of those days is the Waterford Memorial Day Parade, which has been running now for 50 years. One of the largest parades in the state right here in Oakland County, it is sponsored by Heart of the Lakes VFW Post #1008. Hardy, enthusiastic members of OCPHS have been marching up Dixie Highway in this show for five years now, representing the Wisner Home and publicizing our annual Summer Ice Cream Social. We can't praise your efforts enough!!! Here's a rundown of this short 8/10 of a mile walk – which you readers are invited to be a part of next year:

At 9:00 am the gang convened in Burke Lumber's parking lot at Sashabaw and Dixie, along with many other organizations decked out in red, white and blue; the atmosphere in the lot was festive with music, classic cars, balloons, colorful flyers and candy. We society folk were dressed in historical personas, which included a very impressive Colonel Moses Wisner (alias Brian Golden) and a rugged, authentically-dressed Union soldier popularly known as Larry Hathcock. Thank you to Tim Telisky, Rodger Zeller, Nik Karaguleff and Nelson Havnes who portraved artisans and professional men of the period, each with his own distinctive look. God bless Fred Liimatta, walking in his Green Beret fatigues. Dressed beautifully as women of the period were Linda Porter, Jane Karaguleff, Laree Telisky, Catherine Haynes and Yours Truly. Our group moved steadily up the road, distributing event flyers and tossing an assortment of wrapped candy to the polite and expectant children along the curb. Traveling along with us was the Quigley family, whose three precious girls walked and carried signage, rode a decorated bike with training wheels and got pulled along in a wagon by their proud father. Mother Ingrid was invaluable in keeping things rolling along smoothly. Our stock of 1,000 flyers and 1,000 pieces of candy hung on until the final corner was

turned near the Drayton Plains Cemetery at Williams Lake Road. A traditional service in memory of our fallen soldiers was conducted there at the burial ground. May they rest in peace!

In closing, all I can say is thanks so much to all you fine people who participate in the work of this society in so many ways...by your yearly membership renewals, your donations of used items for auctions and sales, your attendance at monthly historical talks and the major advertised events which continue to draw larger crowds every year, and most important of all, your prayers. We can't say enough about the importance of the roles all 360+ of you play in helping us preserve the amazing and courageous history of Oakland County, keeping it available to the public for generations to come!

IN REMEMBRANCE...

In March, OCPHS lost a cherished friend and advocate; Annalee Kennedy of Sylvan Lake passed away at the age of 93. Annalee was born on July 4, 1921 at Pontiac General Hospital. She graduated from Pontiac High School in 1939 and went on to receive her teaching degree, serving the Pontiac School District for 31 years. In addition to her involvement with OCPHS, Annalee was active in the Daughters of the American Revolution. OCPHS member Helen Jane Peters had this to say about her friend Annalee: "She always had time to chat about Sylvan Lake, Pontiac, Whitfield School (where she taught), former students and her family. She was a walking history book and I often called on her for a story, picture, book or her memory of a person or event. Annalee will be missed for her sweet spirit and love of people."
