


# teachers! A new year!







Weep not for me when I take up my oar And drift downstream to meet the setting sun; To me 'twill only mean the day is done; The kindly current bears me safely on Down Stream






















Judy Levine's voice goes over the air as Janet Eilender provides the background music and Bill Riley operates the console which makes the broadcast possible.








