Science Emphasis Brings About Curriculum Change

Three basic studies make up the science curriculum: biology, chemistry, and physics.

The subject matter studied in general biology depends greatly upon the teacher. This biology course gives a brief survey of the human anatomy and its functions, and a basic understanding of the body in relation to its environment.

Two types of chemistry, are chem. study and college prep. chemistry. The degree of difficulty between the two is very close; however, different approaches are used. Chem. study students seek their answers through experiments, whereas chemistry students experiment to substantiate answers.

Physics is a study of the familiar physical world. Though it began as a philosophy, the modern approach to physics has something to interest everyone, and consequently, it would benefit anyone taking it.

Research and new advances in science have broadened the field of business education. Skills in communication, and office procedures have progressed as a result of scientific progress. Communication skills include shorthand, typing, and data processing. The development of computers and the perfection of typewriters have contributed greatly to efficient business practices.

Understanding Natural Laws



"Understanding why natural laws must be obeyed is an important part of the classroom phase of driver education," according to *Tomorrow's Drivers*, the basic text used in driver education. Some of the laws of nature which affect the handling of a car are concerned with gravity, friction, inertia, kinetic energy, and force of impact.

A very common type of automobile accident is one which concerns a violation of these natural laws. Many young drivers violate such laws due to a lack of experience. Because of the importance of these natural laws, they have become the basis of many man-made laws.

Trade and industrial education includes automotives, drafting, wood shop, electronics, printing, welding, and metal works. All of these areas have been greatly influenced by recent advances in science and technology.

Automotives deals with the laws of physics and also with mechanical power. Drafting is based upon the science of mathematics and the skills and abilities to construct two and three dimensional representations. The field of electronics is dependent on the laws of physics and electricity, while metal shop teaches a kind of practical chemistry.

Without science, there would be no trade and industrial department; or is it the other way around?



Library service is designed to give students an opportunity to: broaden their personal experiences; become more adept in the use of books; explore vocational interests; give service to fellow students and teachers; develop and use special abilities and skills; help provide increased and improved library service to the school community.

Student librarians have varied duties such as: circulation services; shelving services; room services; reserve materials services; book repair and processing, newspaper and magazine services; and general clerical services. 

Co-op Program Grows

The co-op program in which supervised "earn-as-you-learn" work experience is combined with related in-school study, is growing by leaps and bounds, according to Vocational and Technical Education Director Maurice C. Prottenger. As of Jan. 31, a total of 363 students from Pontiac Central and Pontiac Northern High Schools were involved in the program. Five years ago, the enrollment was 224.

Nine part-time coordinators carry the major responsibility for the operation of Pontiac's co-op program. They seek out training stations for the students in the business community, match the students with the jobs available and consult with both the students and employers at regular intervals during the semester.

To qualify for the co-op program, a student must be 16 years of age or older, have a good attendance record, and indicate an interest in the occupation as a career goal. He also should have taken, or be taking, a related course.








