# Increased Use of Library Reported




Since the elimination of study halls the library has seen more use according to Librarian Faith Werner. It is open between 7:45 A.M. and 3:00 P.M. every


Although no math is required for graduation, the courses offered range from Elementary Math to Advanced Trigonometry.

A rapid learner program exists at Central and students can remain in it for three years






#### A Major Part Played in the School Curriculum


Some are tempted to forget that Home Economics is also included in vocational education. After all, homemaking is a recognized vocation. Classes offered in this field are Home Management and Child Development.



Coach Grubb stated that, "for being such a small team, we played a strong defensive game and really hustled on offense." He also felt that each member contributed greatly to the success


of the team.




### Booth, Breen Lead Grapplers

Teachers make up the only clientele of this self-operating restaurant.



This year proved to be another active and successful year for the PCH instrumental music department.




