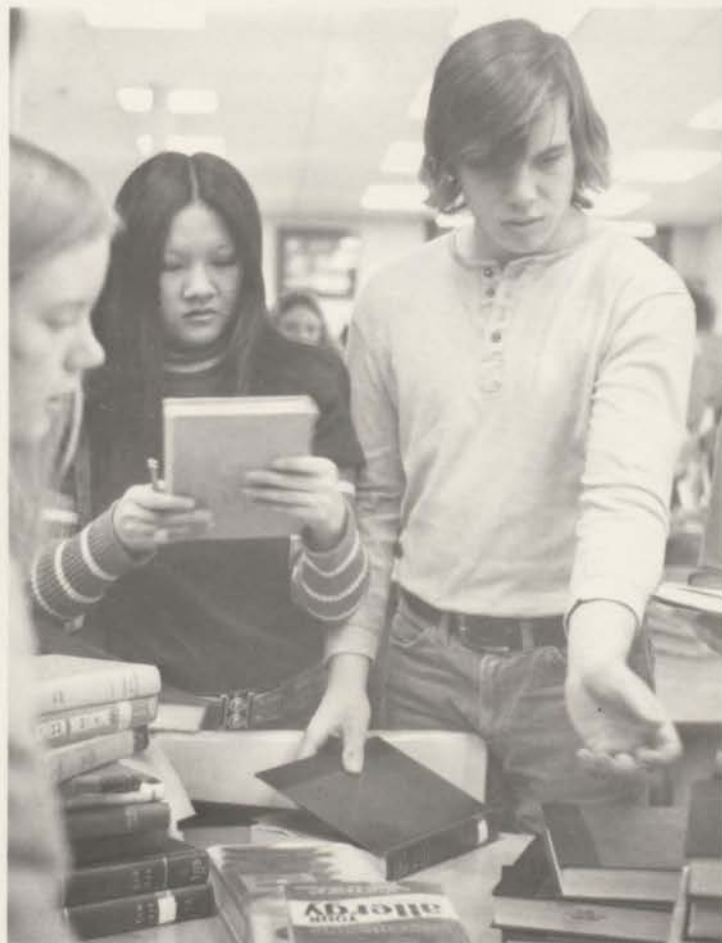
## Increased Use of Library Reported



Since the elimination of study halls the library has seen more use according to Librarian Faith Werner.

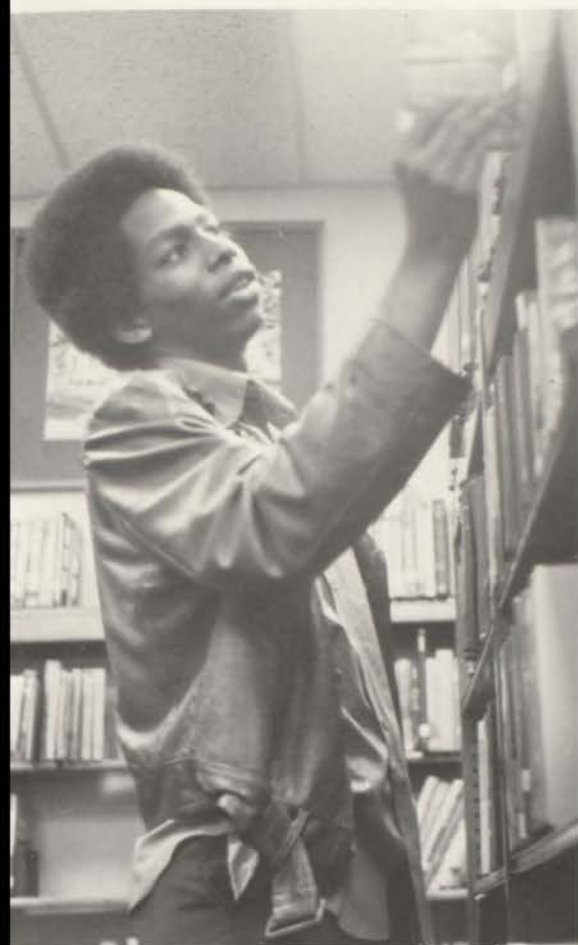
It is open between 7:45 A.M. and 3:00 P.M. every day. Students must have a pass to enter after 1:30 because of the restrictions on being in the building.

The tour of the research laboratories is an opportunity offered for high school seniors who plan to be in scientific research after receiving the necessary degrees.

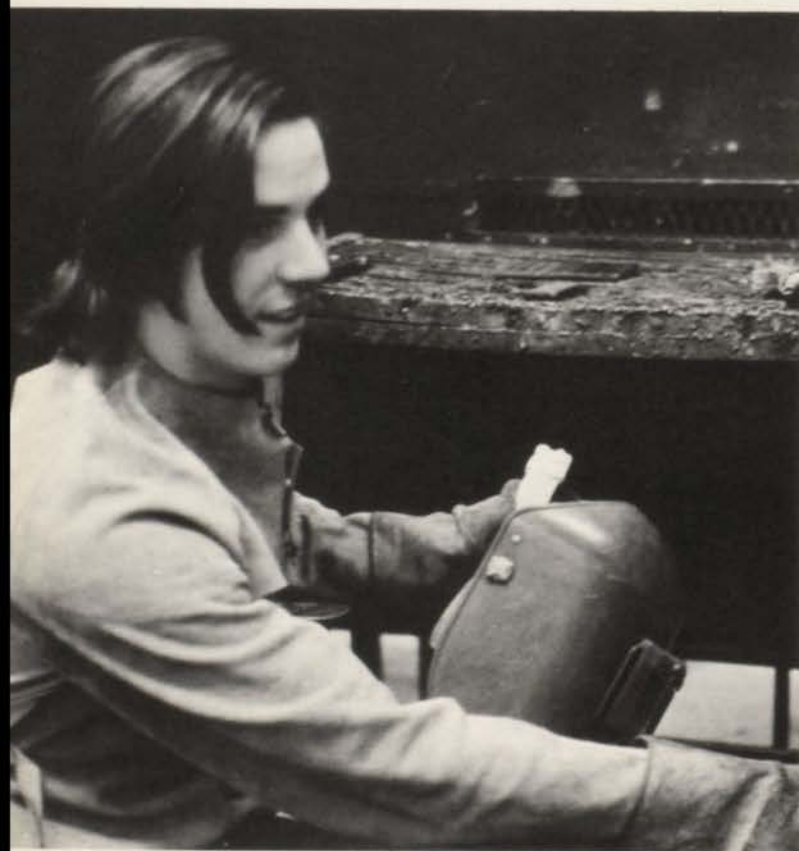
# A Major Part Played in the School Curriculum

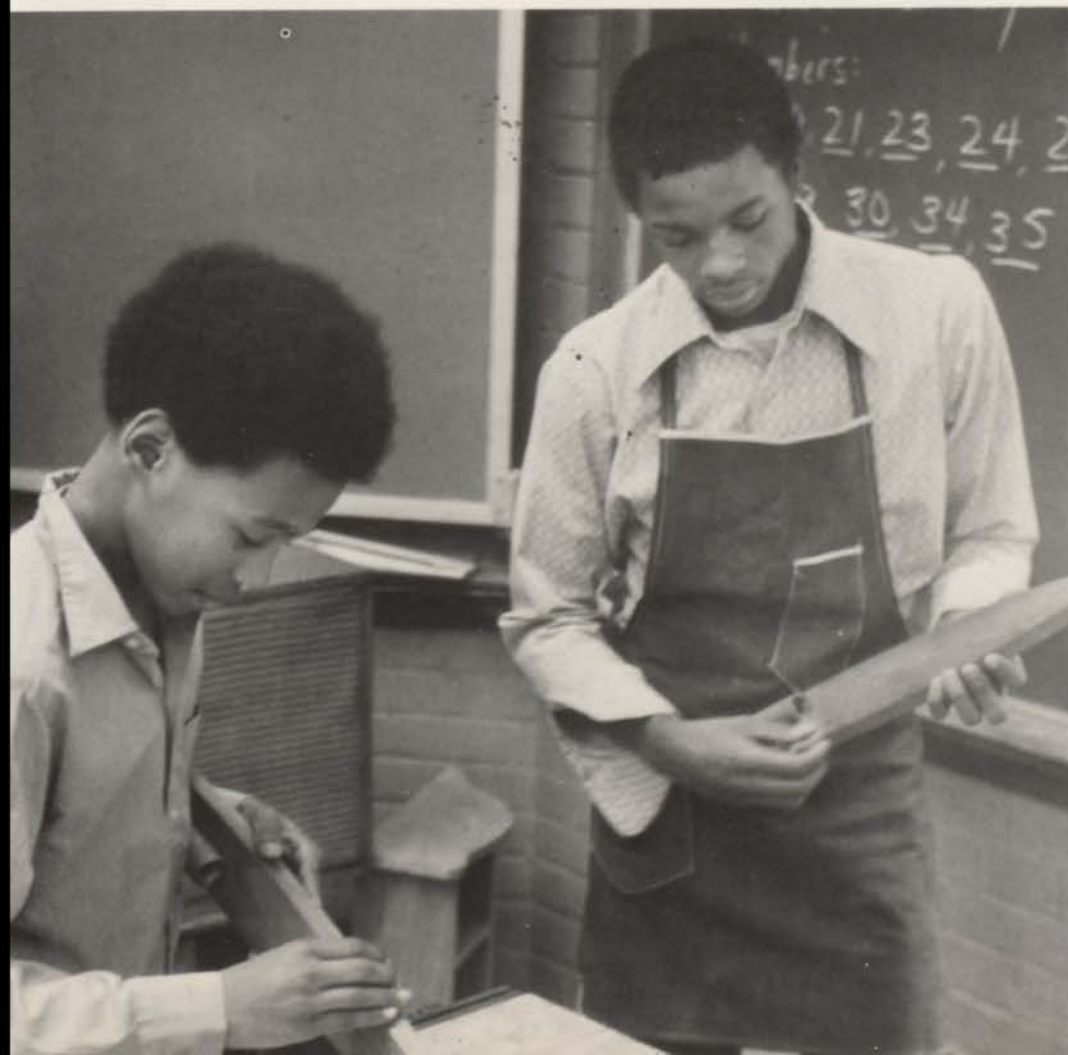

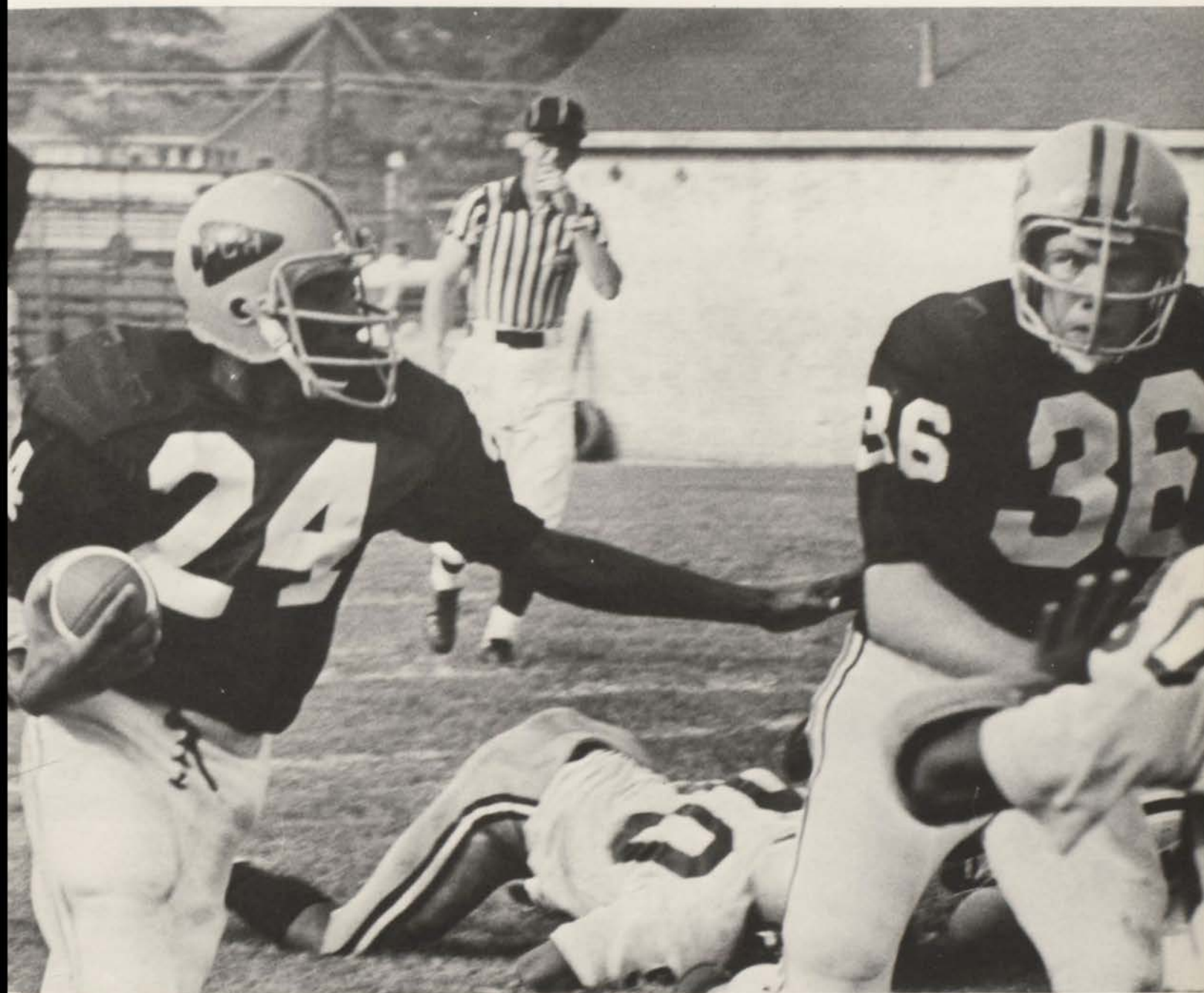

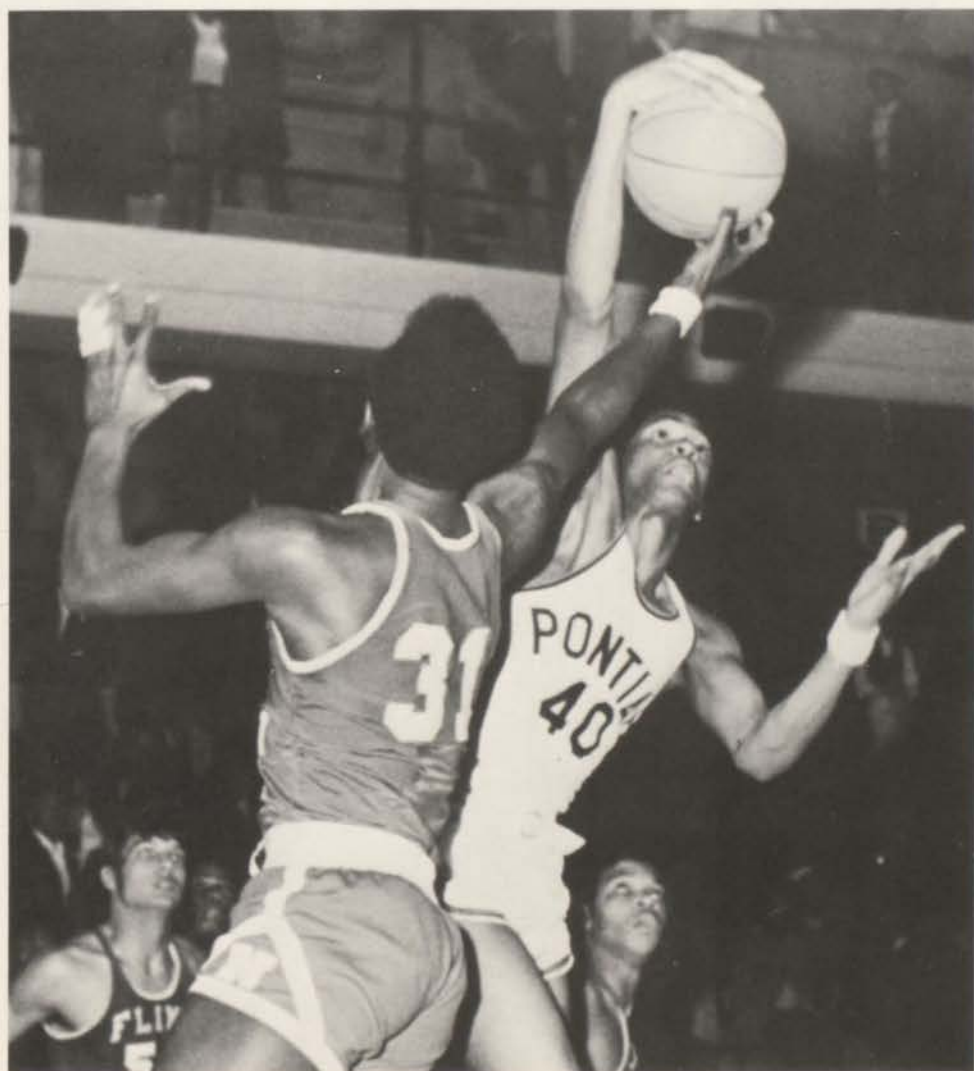




**Top left:** Bruce Woodmore keeps the ball alive for the Chiefs as he anticipates his teammates' actions.

# Mighty Chiefs of Pontiac

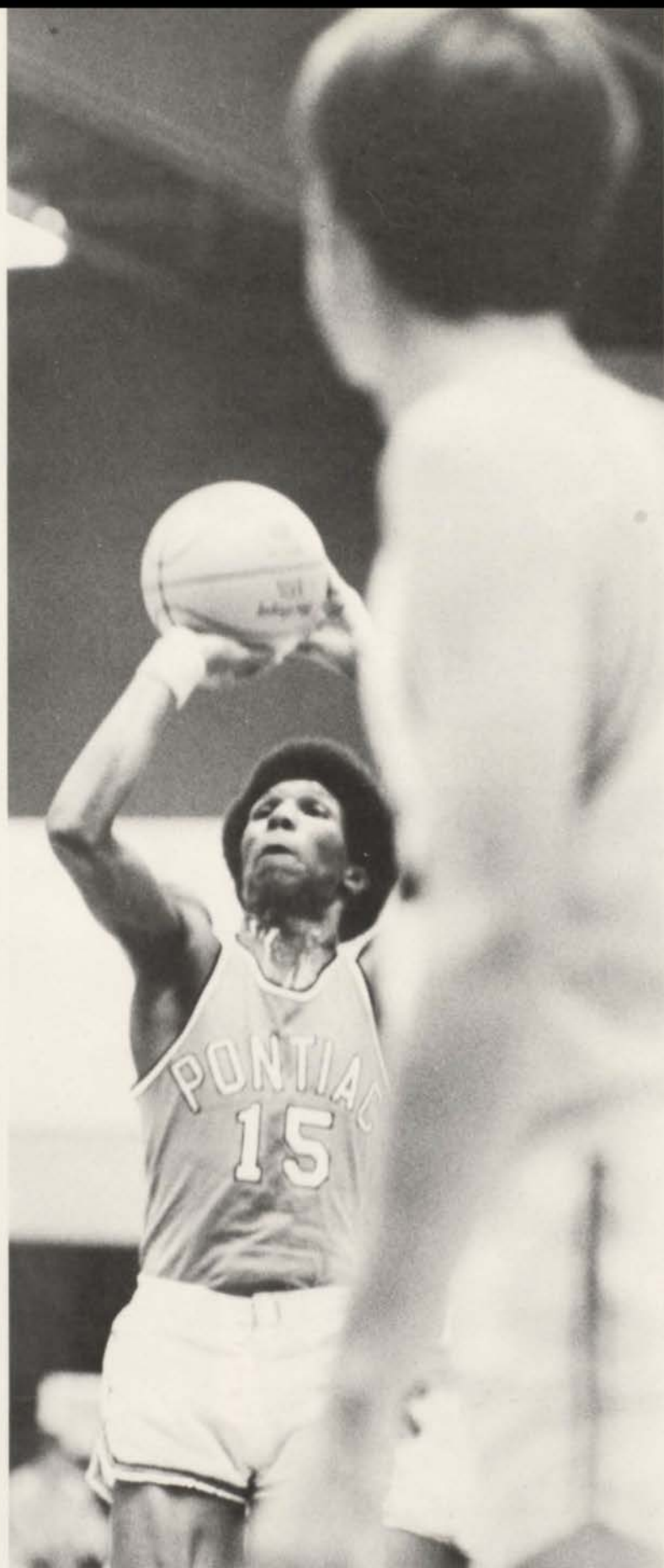

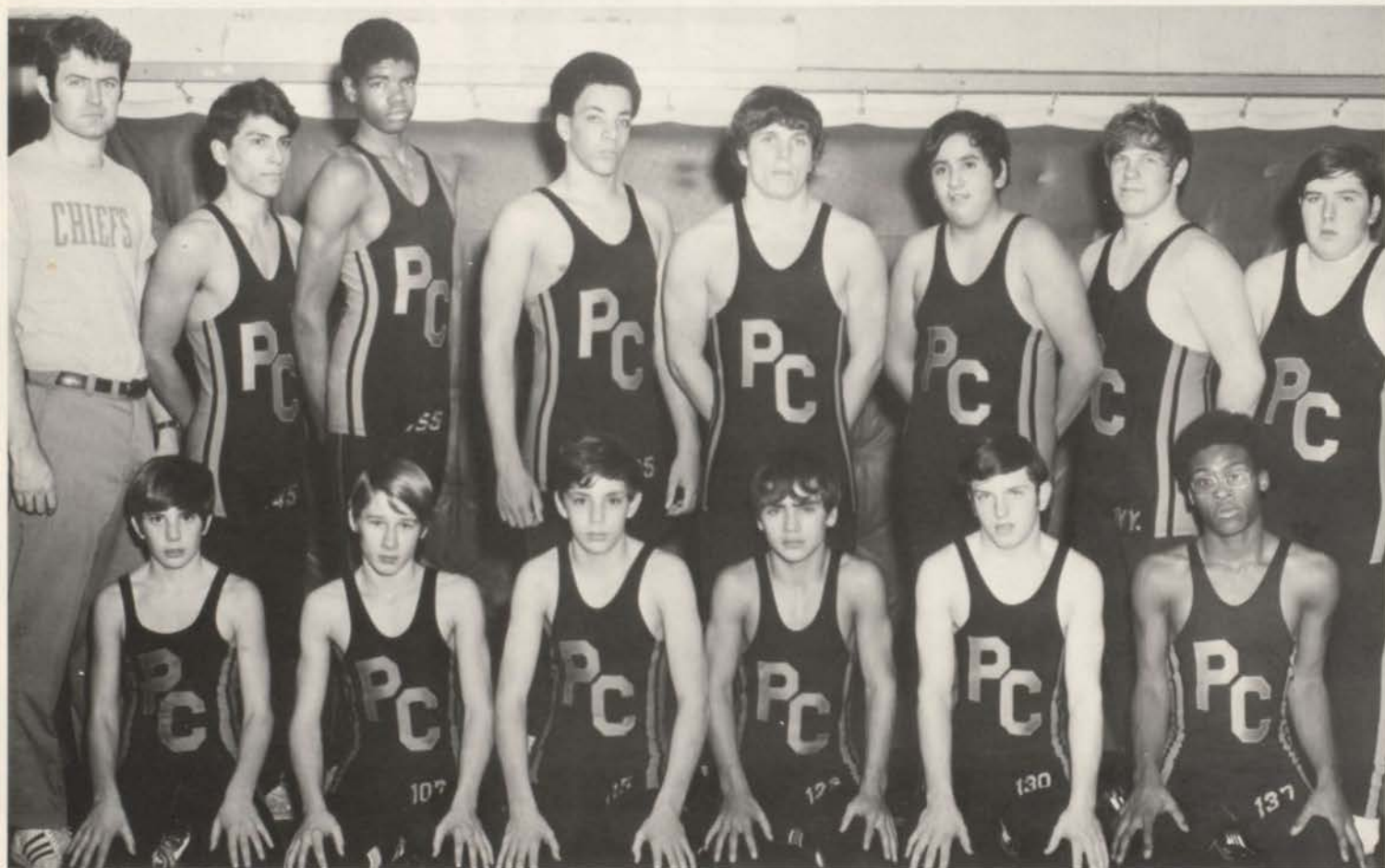
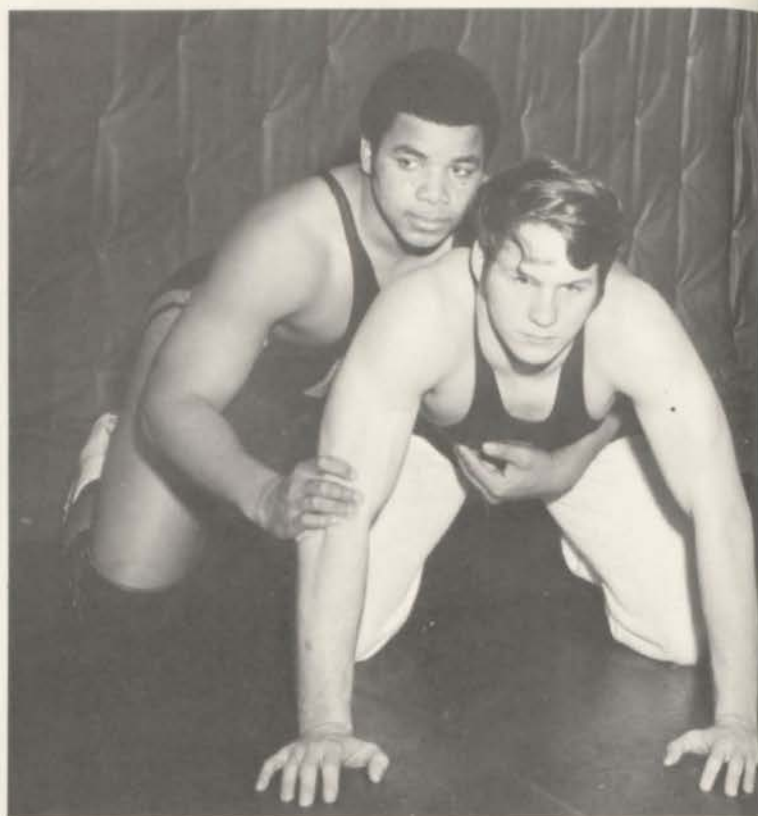
## Booth, Breen Lead Grapplers

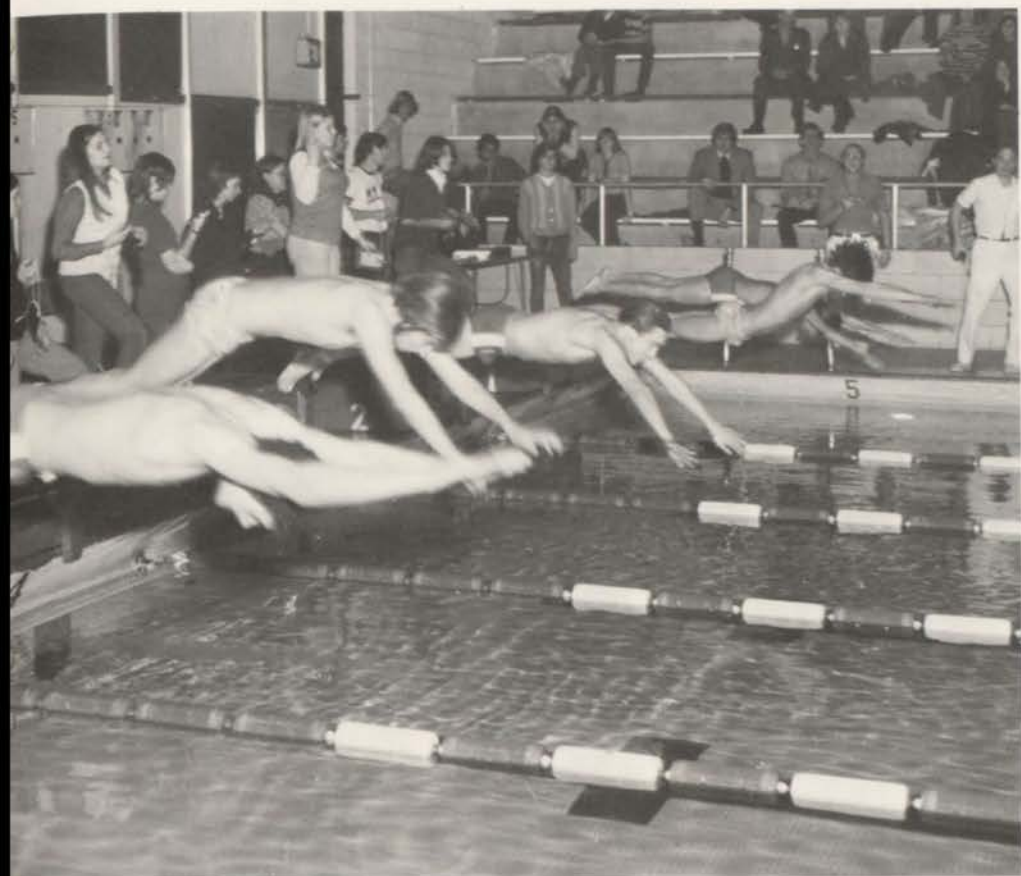

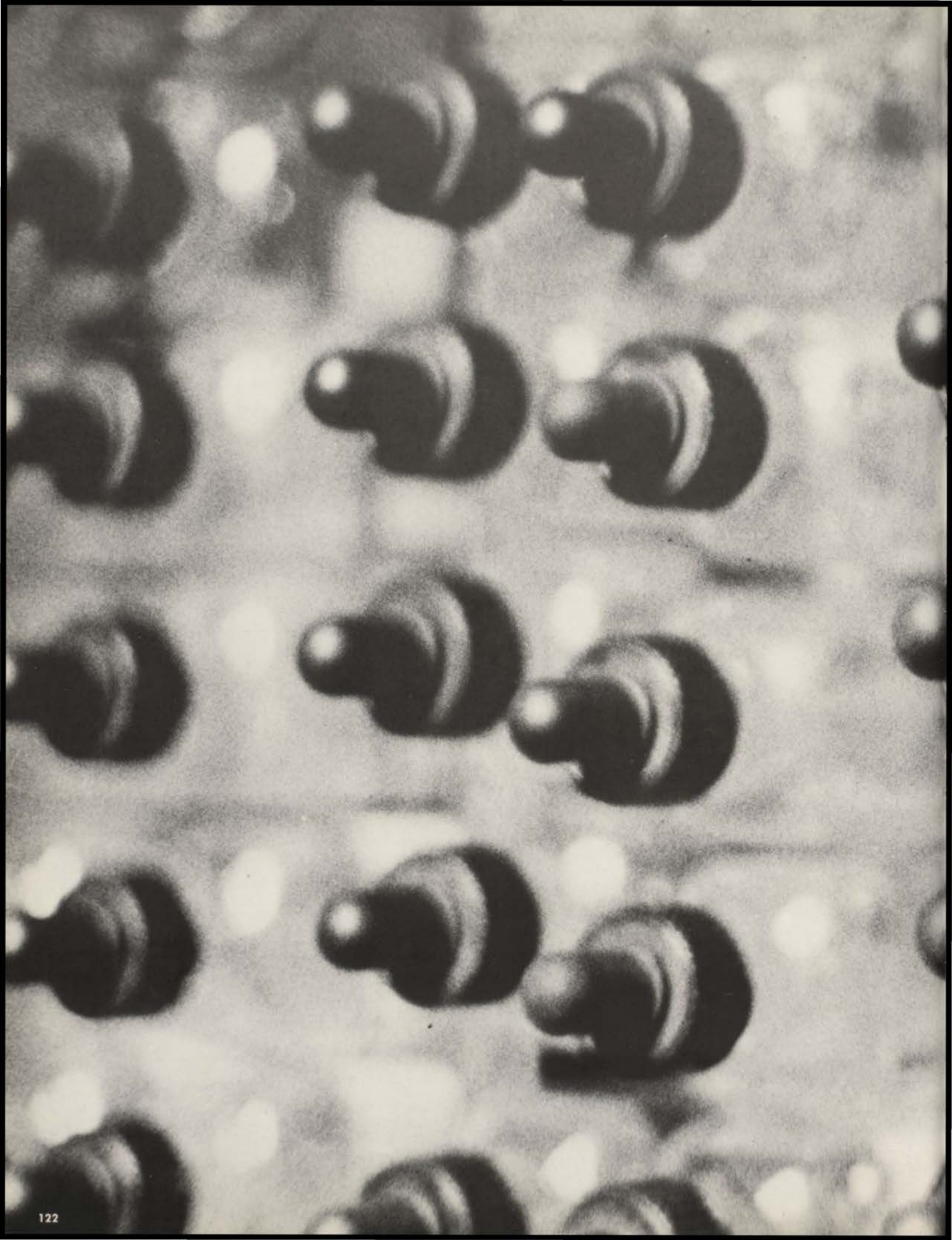


The name of this loosely knit group explains itself. It was an attempt to open up communication between the students and the administration.

# The Big Band

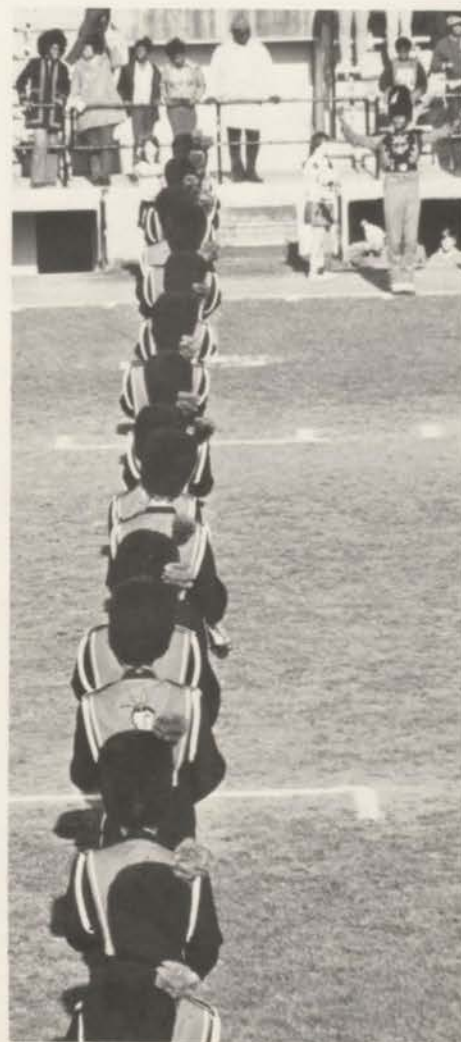
This year proved to be another active and successful year for the PCH instrumental music department.

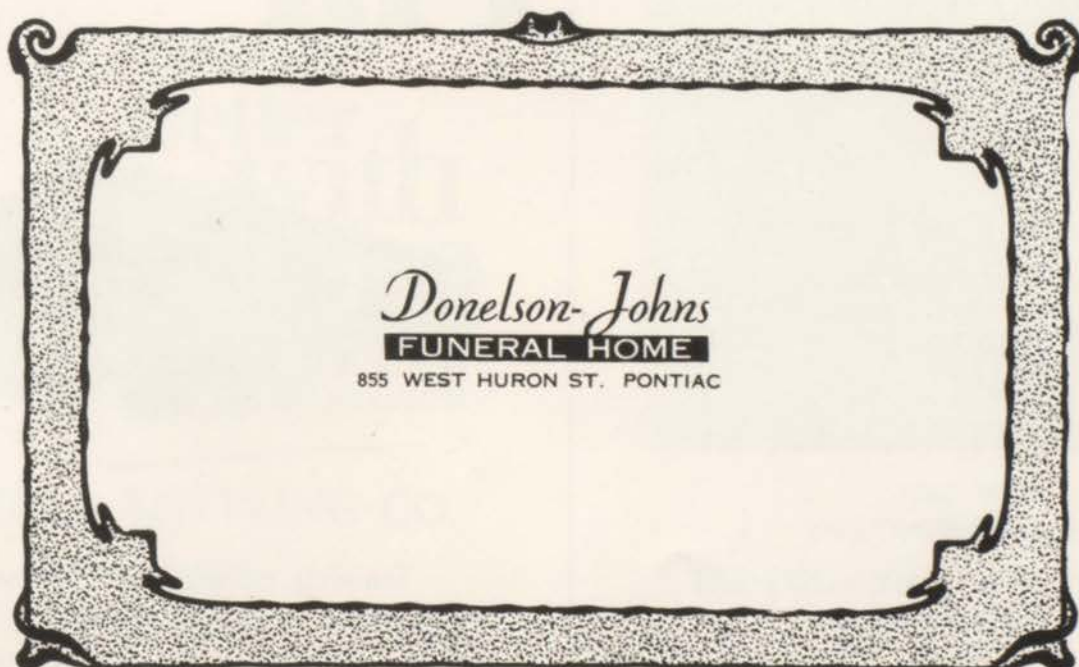

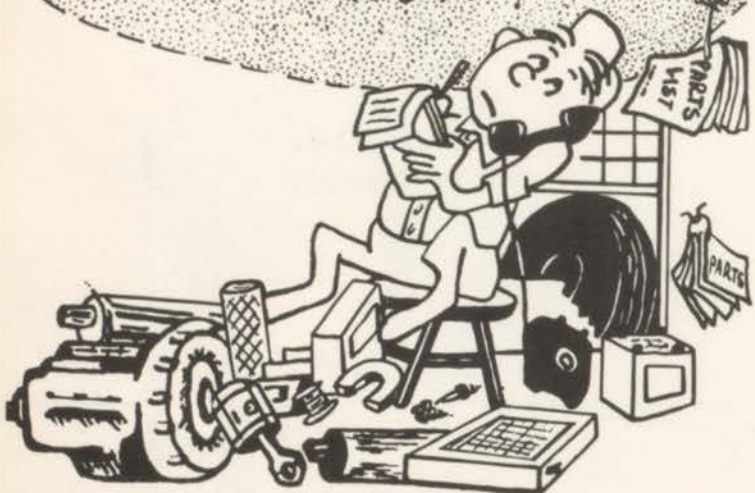
