






Twins for A Day






The Chiefs Are in the House




First of all, I must thank a good friend of mine for picking and prodding me to join the B.D.C. If not for her, I doubt I would have joined. Thanks, Genia.

Futuristic Learning For The Future-SERC

Those dreams of learning by television are here now within the very walls of PCH. This program is called SERC (Satellite Enteractive Research Consortium). In other words, Japanese and Russian classes are beamed into the school via satellite. The classes offered at PCH are Japanese I and II and Russian I. Three days a week students are taught their particular language by a television teacher. The remaining two days are spent speaking their language with a teacher over a phone line. Besides the lanquage instruction the classes also teach about the culture associated with the lanquage the students are learning. Advisor Mr. Richardson says that these classes are special because not even all the "rich" schools have this program. More importantly these classes are accelerated to a college level therefore giving them advanced placement class status. Most of all SERC allows students to study languages out of the traditional French and Spanish.








Michigan Youth In Government


















Boys Golf!






Boys Track Valley Champs!






Black blasts of the blocks in hopes of a victory.
