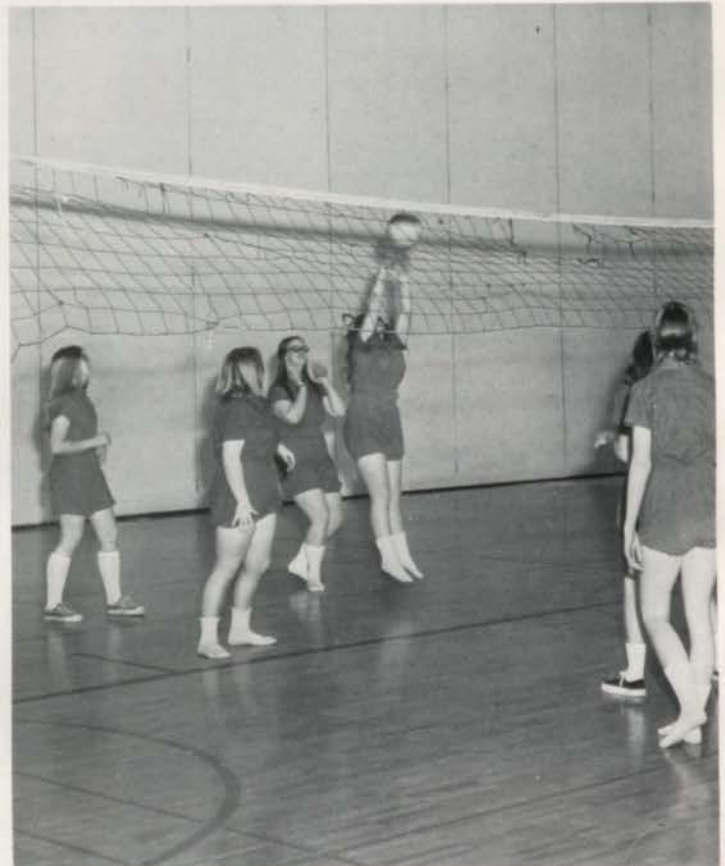

Michigan becomes 15th state to ratify 18-year-old vote

LANSING — Michigan has become the 15th state to ratify a proposed U.S. constitutional amendment giving 18-year-olds the right to vote despite protests that the Legislature's action ignores the will of the people.

The Senate approved the measure, 24-12, yesterday after long and heated debate. The House has passed the proposal on March 24 by 88-22.

The amendment, if ratified by the legislatures of 38 states, will become the 26th Amendment to the U.S. Constitution. On Tuesday Kansas became the 14th state to ratify.

Backers of the amendment say it will

stitution in time for the 1972 presidential election.

The amendment was proposed by Congress last month to end the possibility that some states might have to run elections with dual registration lists.

The dilemma arose last year after Congress passed the voting rights act of 1970. The act would have given the vote to all citizens over 18 in all elections.

However, the U.S. Supreme Court ruled that while Congress could designate the age at which persons may vote in federal election — for president, vice-president and Congress — it could not

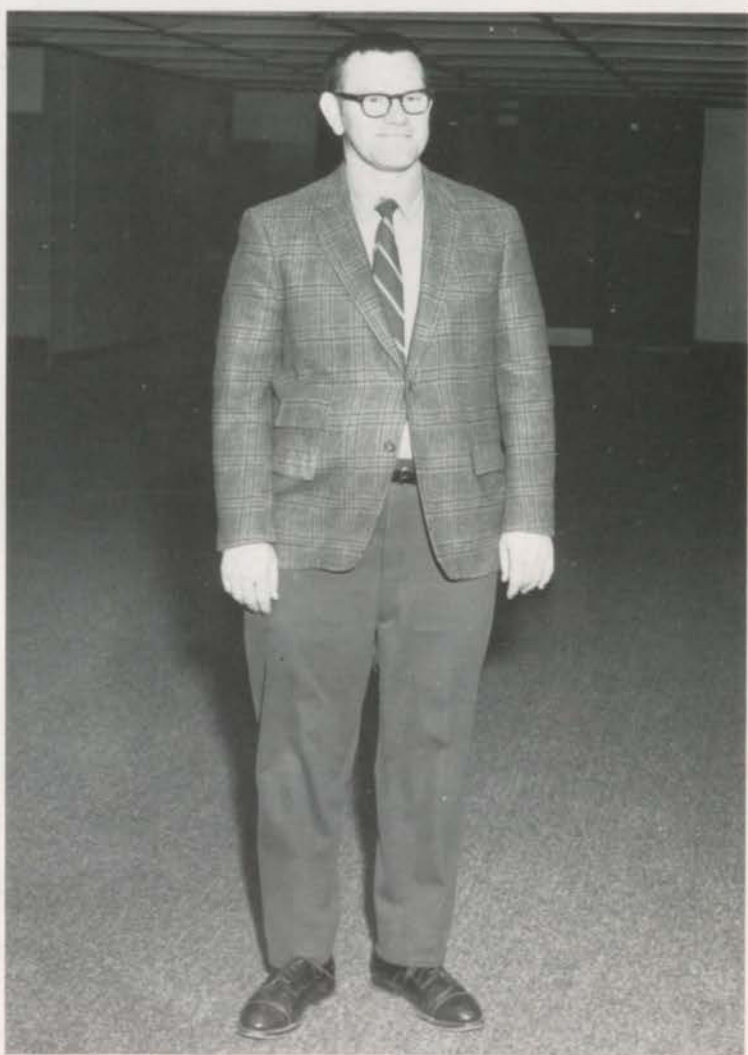

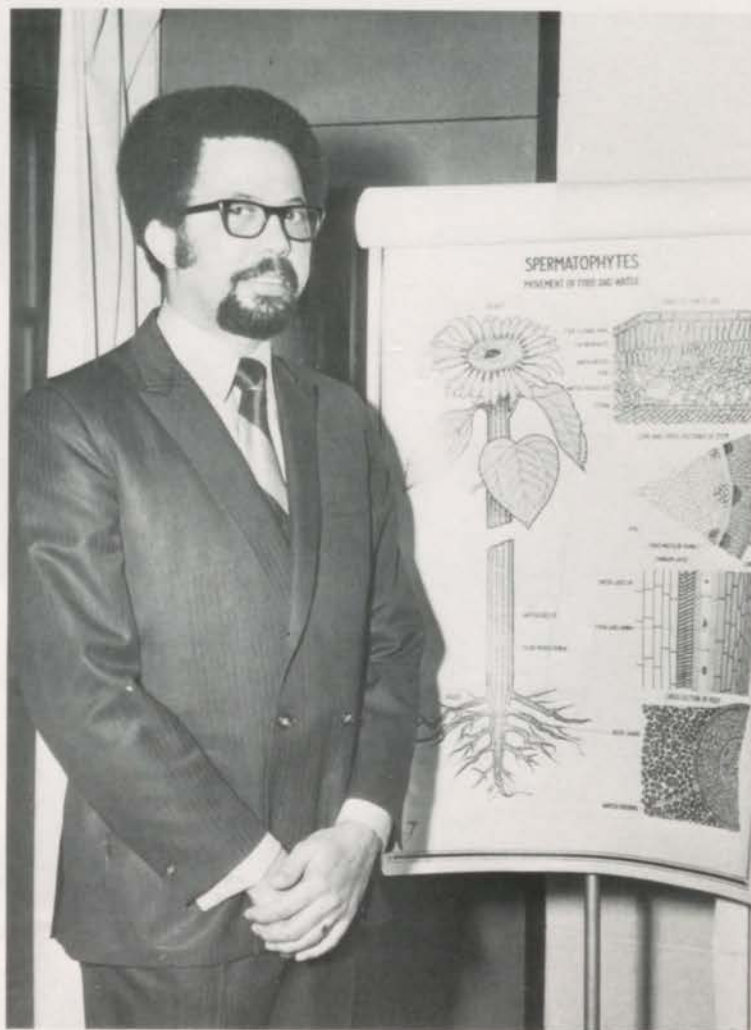

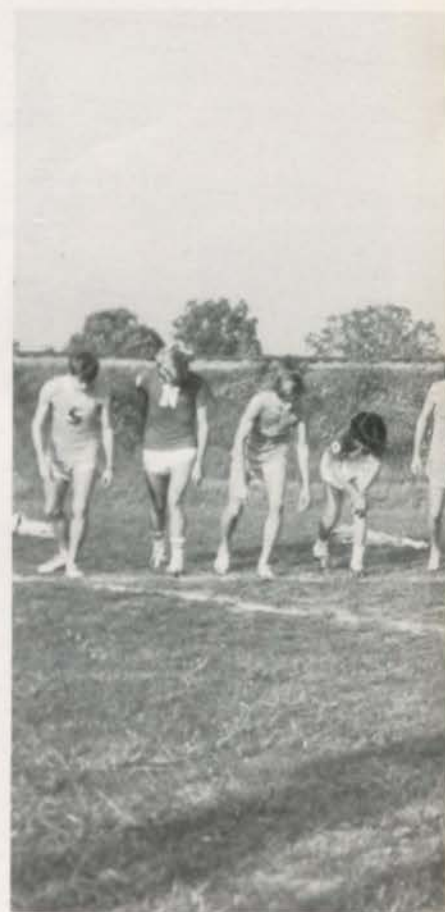

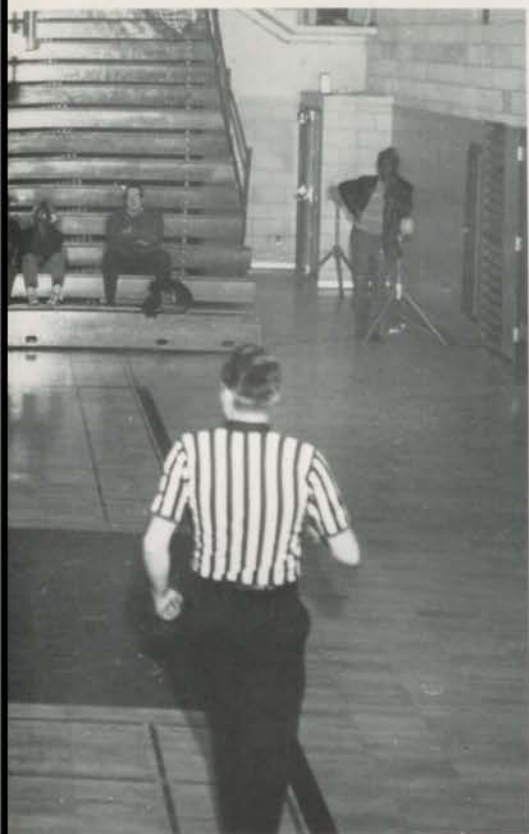

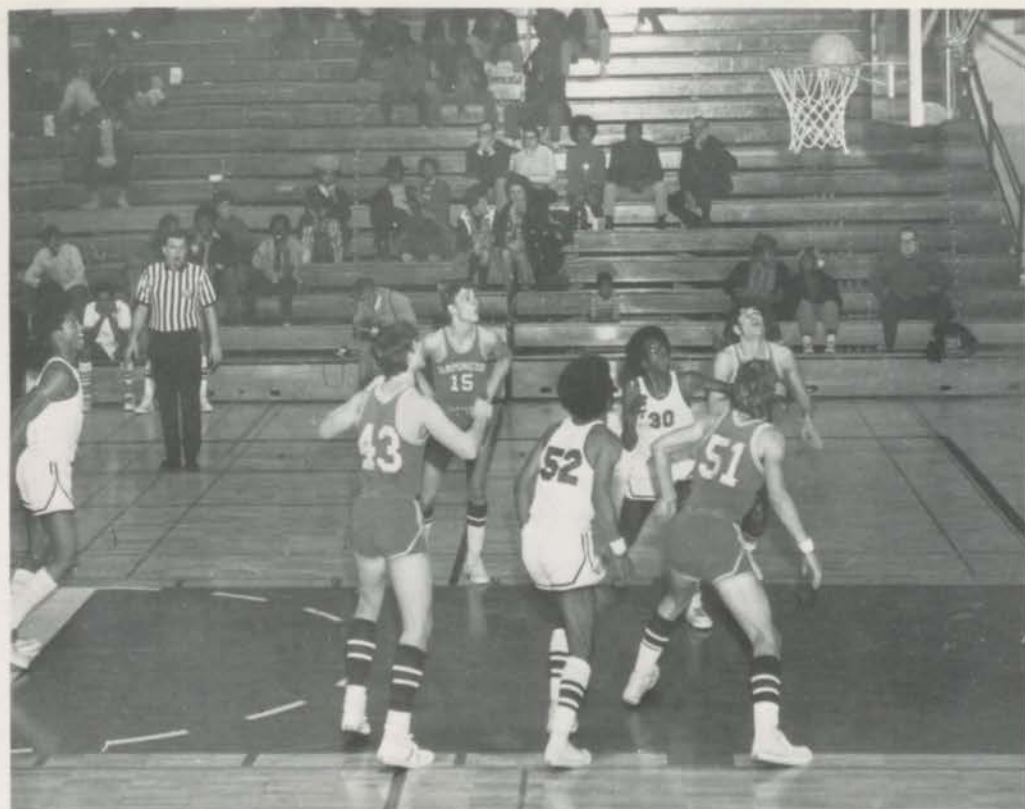

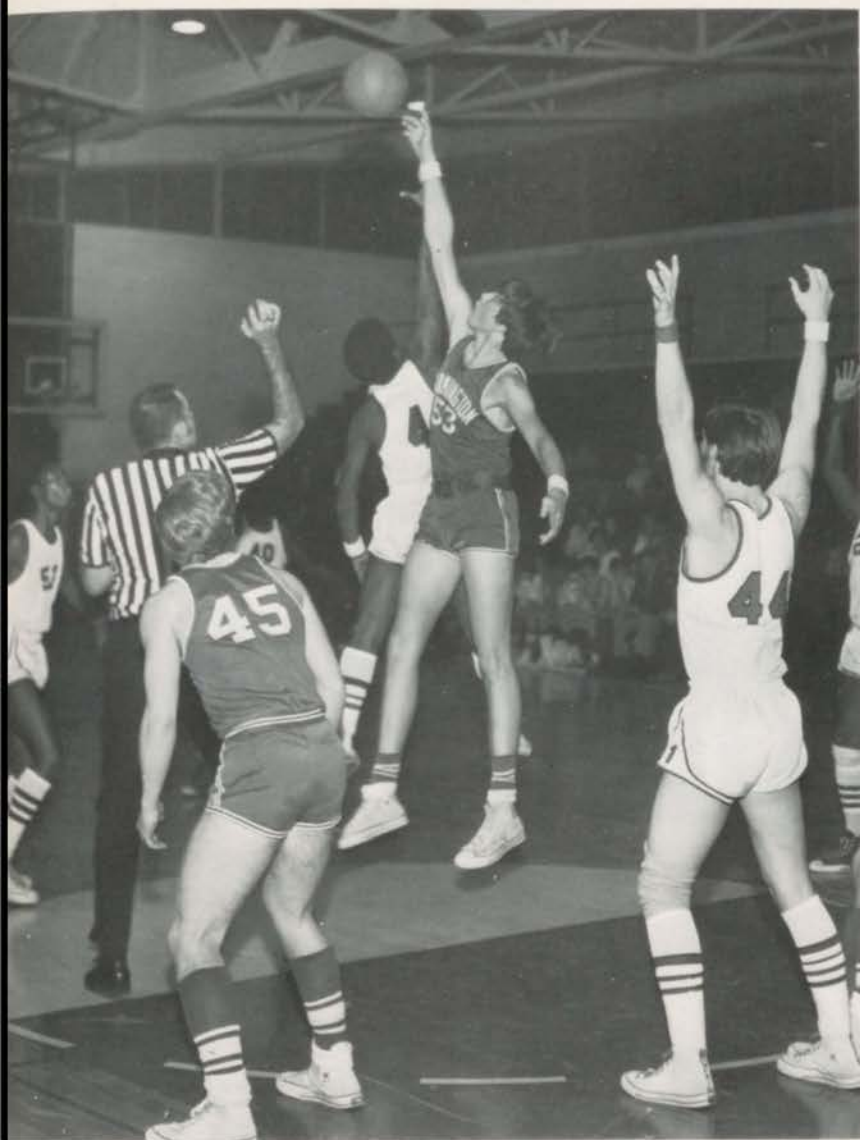

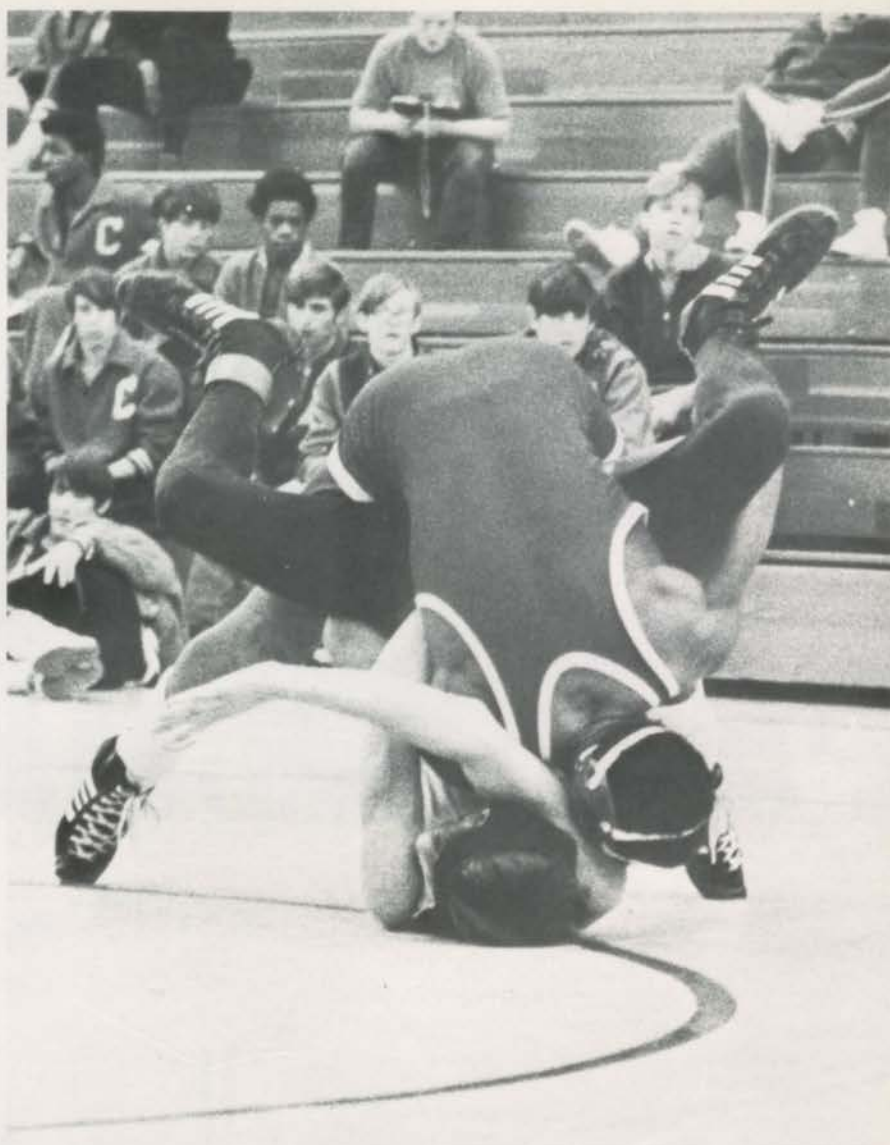


We Want A Pin

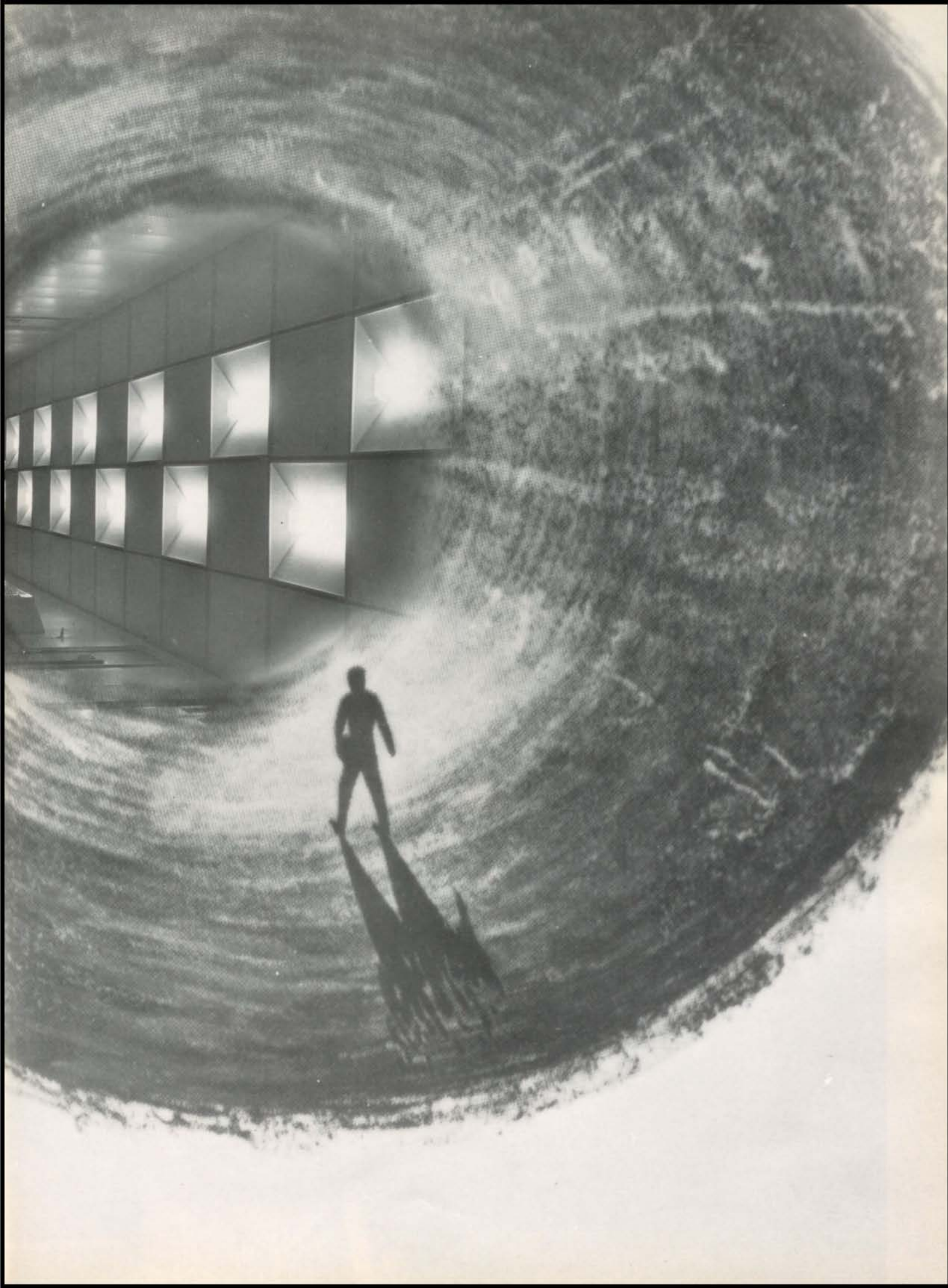

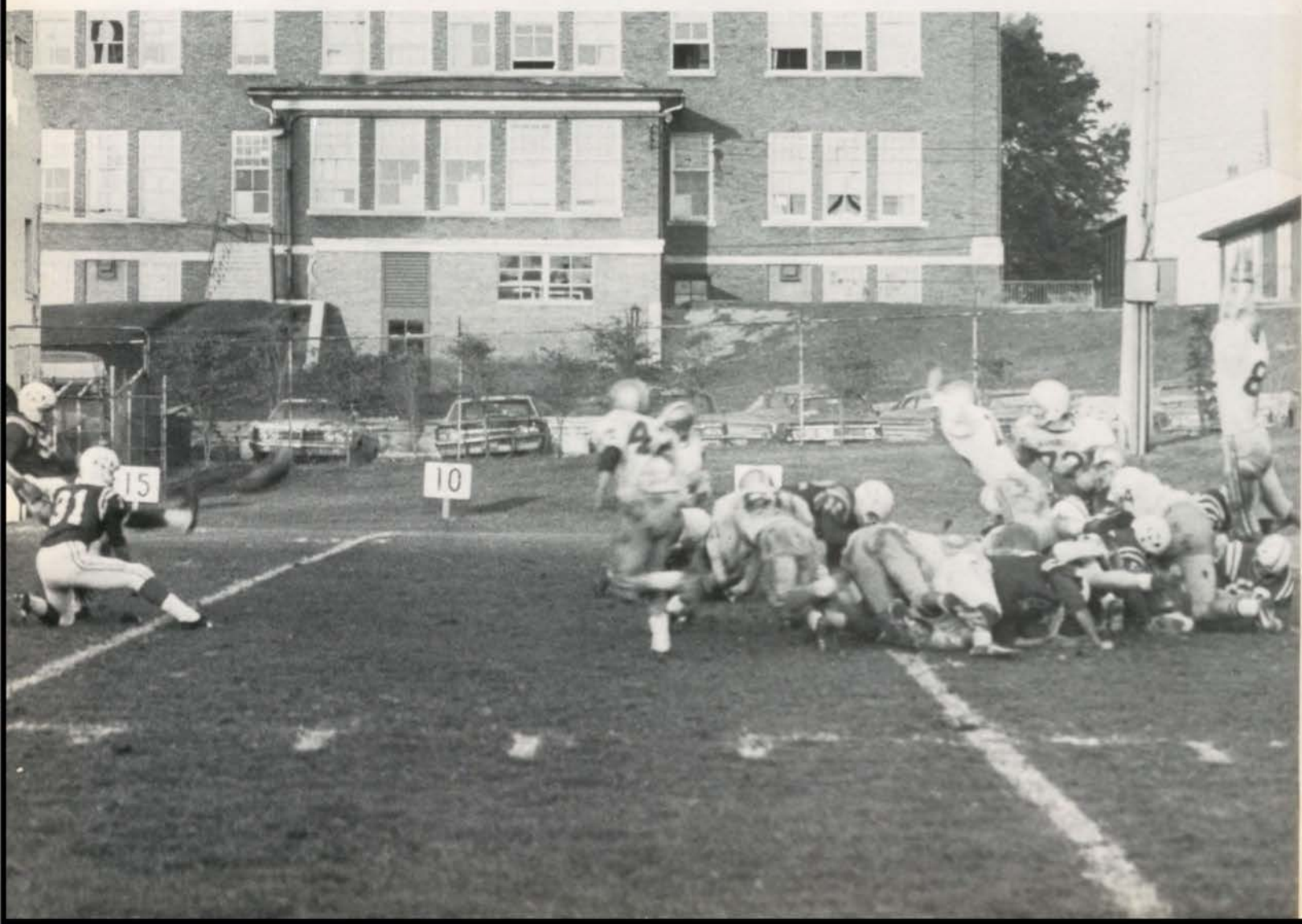

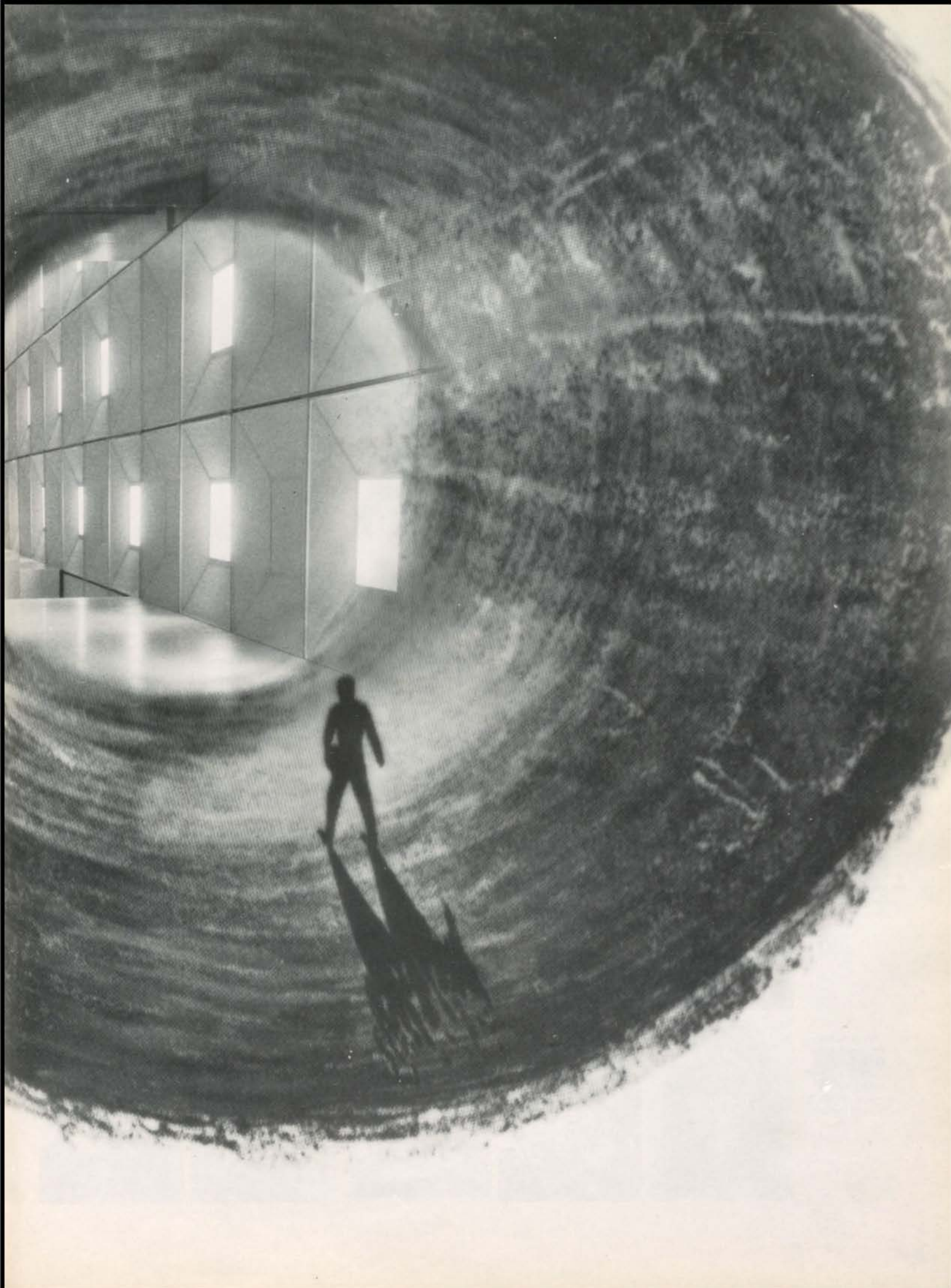
