I hope Canada is not one of these.





After much hard work and determination Pontiac was chosen as the site for the new Detroit Lions Stadium.






As the leaders of the future it is up to us to be aware of the turmoil that exists in our country. It is up to us to bring America honor and nobility that it deserves.

After we graduate from Pontiac Northern High School we will look back with fond memories on our life as a student.



We feel that the staff at Pontiac Northern is the best to be found anywhere. Our teachers give much of themselves to their job and subsequently we are the ones that benefit,



Whatever the English class, all the students are taught to express their ideas and thoughts both orally and in writing. All of this will be very helpful in our future lives,



Northern's Social Studies department is a good one and offers many interesting classes. Some are U.S. History, American Government, World Geography and History, Sociology, and Psychology.




















