
Why are there so many songs about rainbows, and what's on the other side?

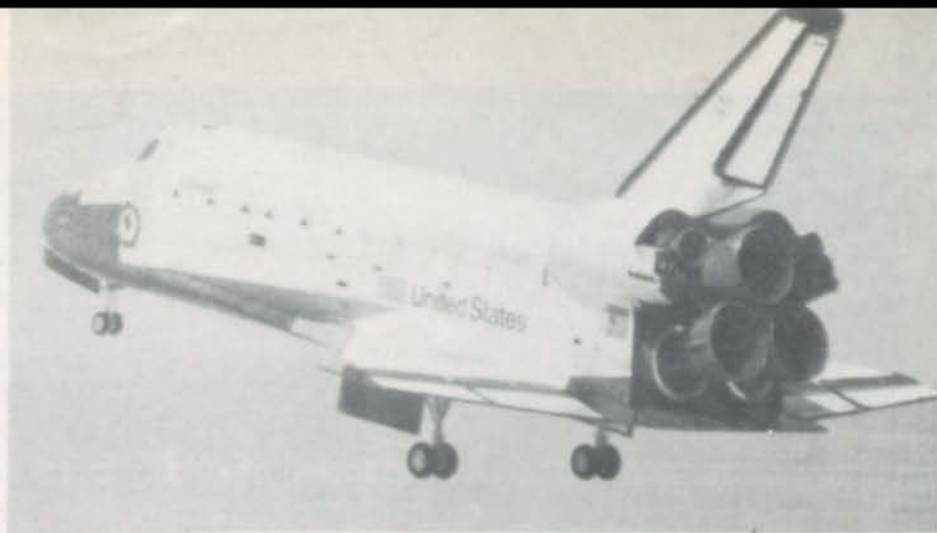
***Everything's

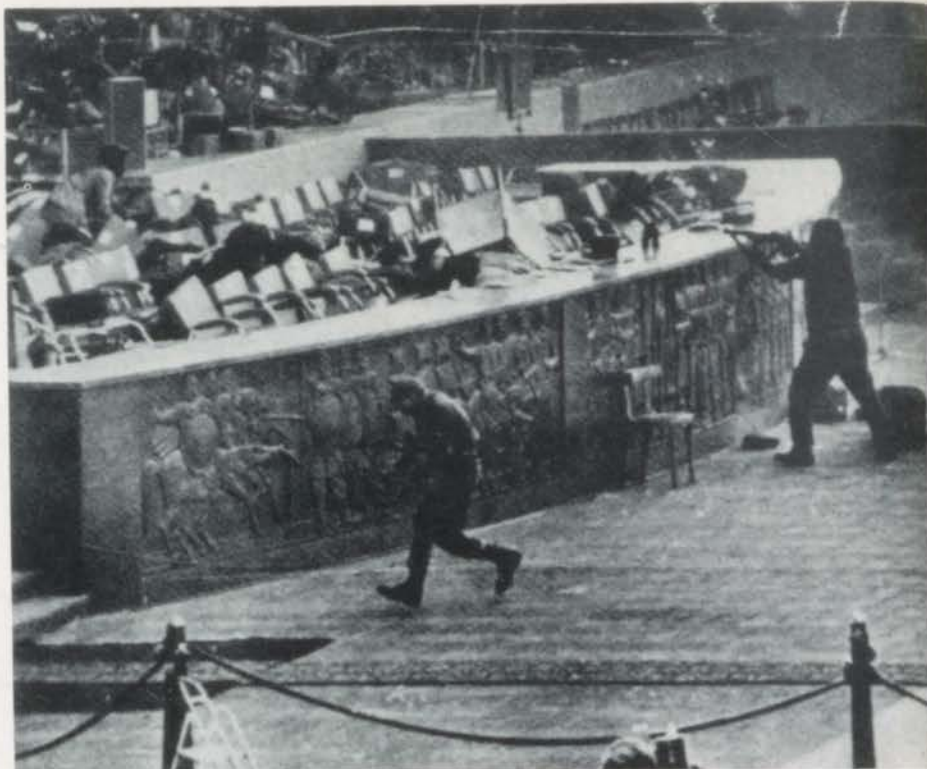


Achievement of mankind and Todays Disaster.

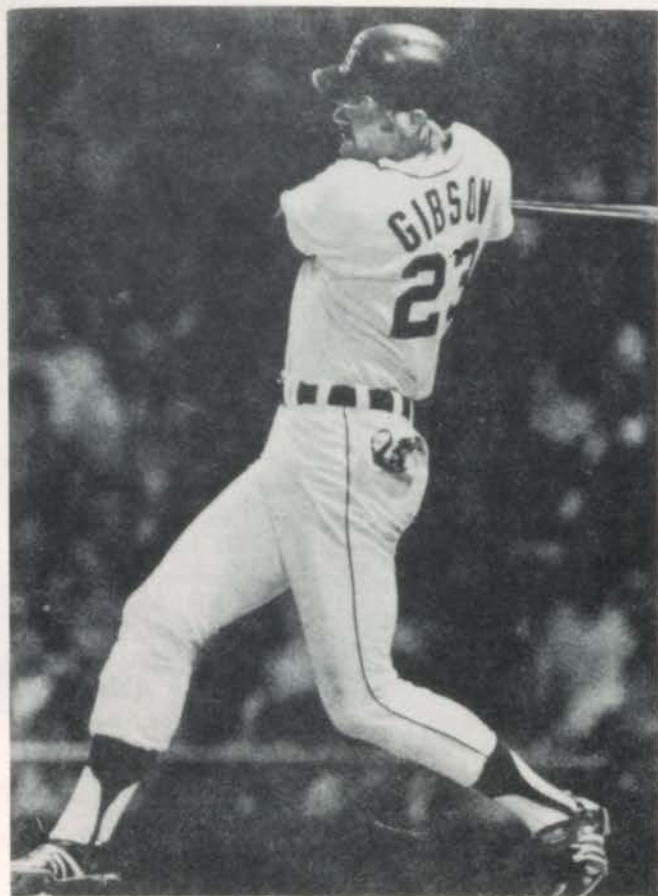
Tomorrows threat.

Super Bowl 16 comes to Pontiac.

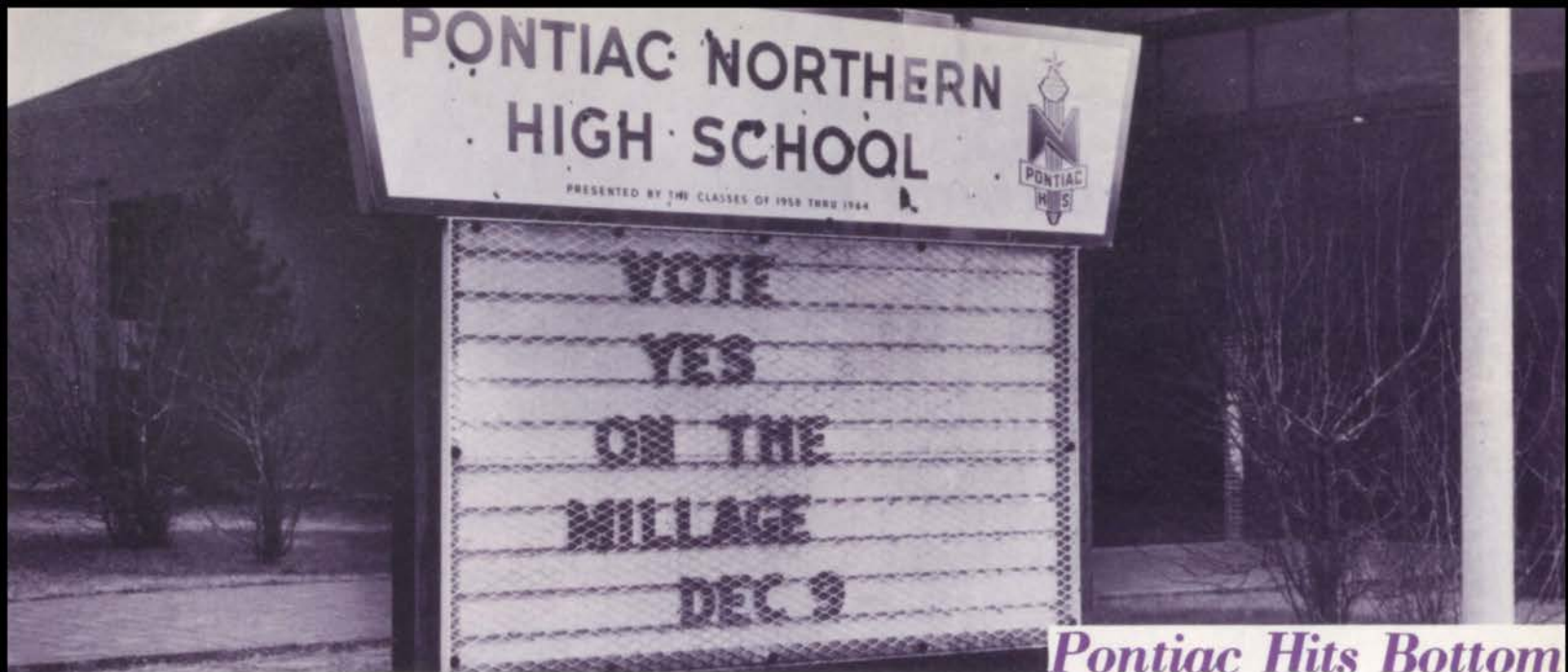

The Rainbow Of Today

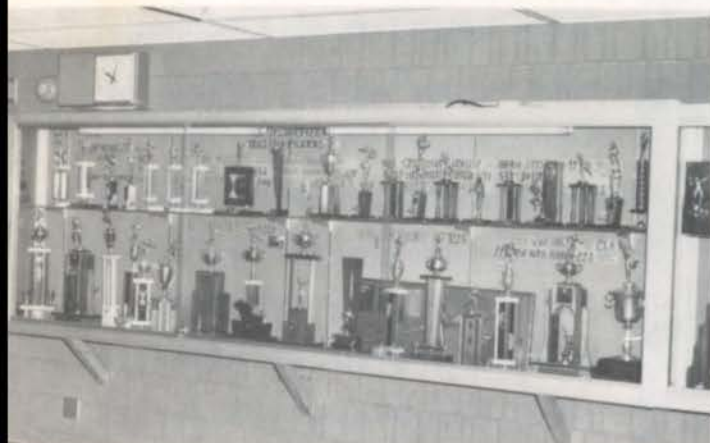

make life fascinating. But how come a rainbow?*

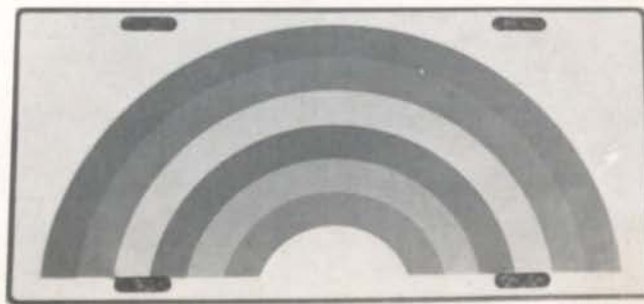

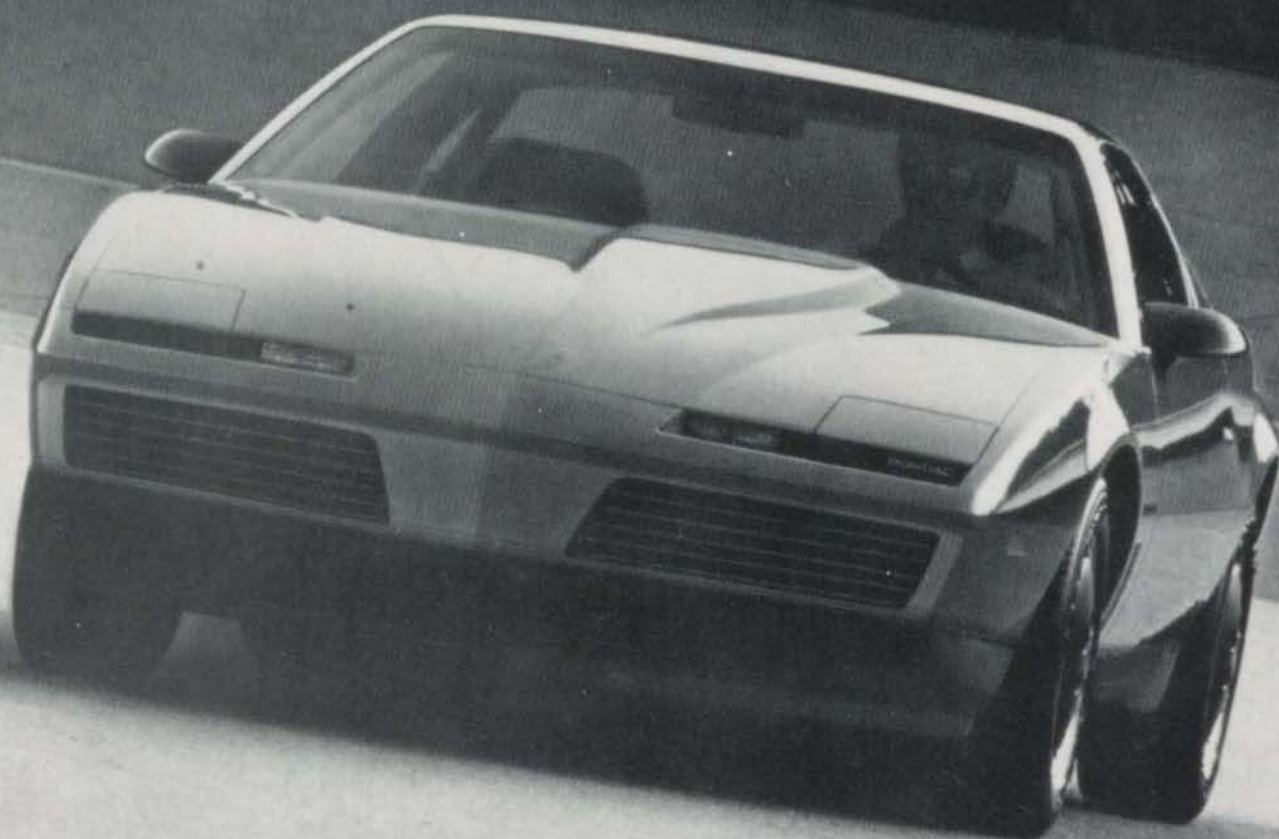

- 4) During the tug of war the sophomores showed their strength and won all the heats.



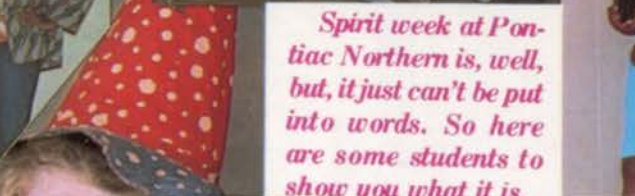


Extra! Extra! *Read all about* *it, the greatest* *teams to ever* *hit Pontiac* *Northern.*

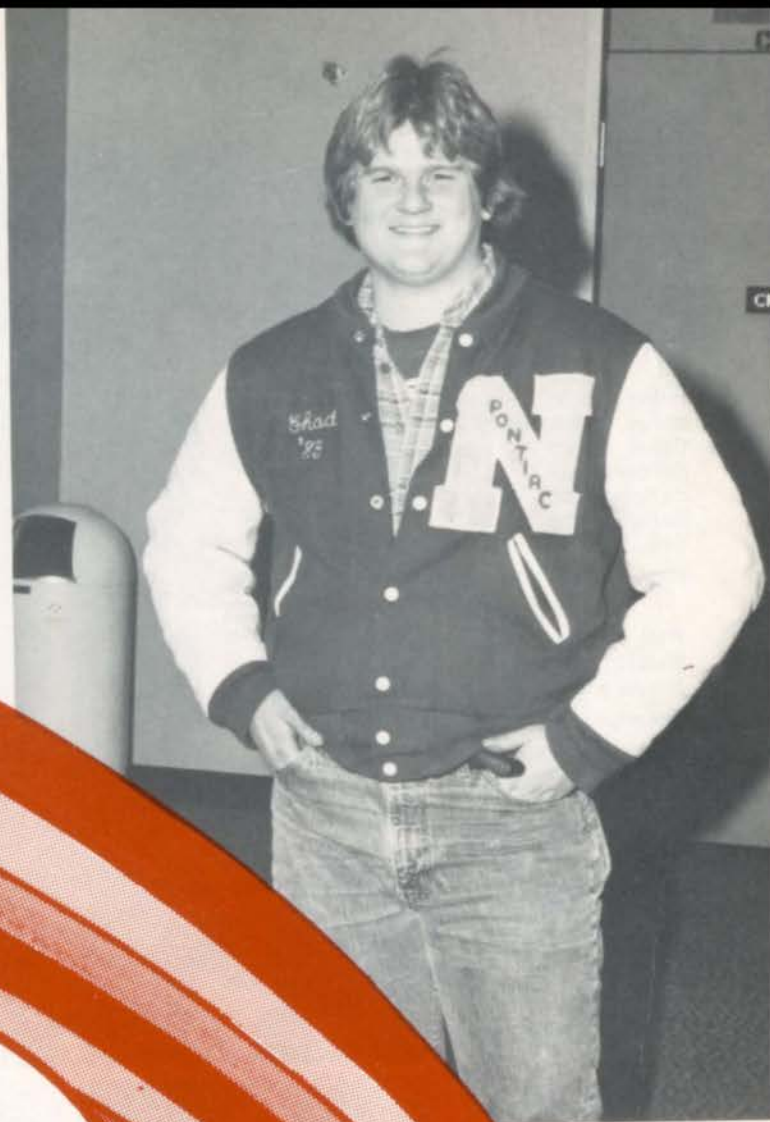


The Blossom

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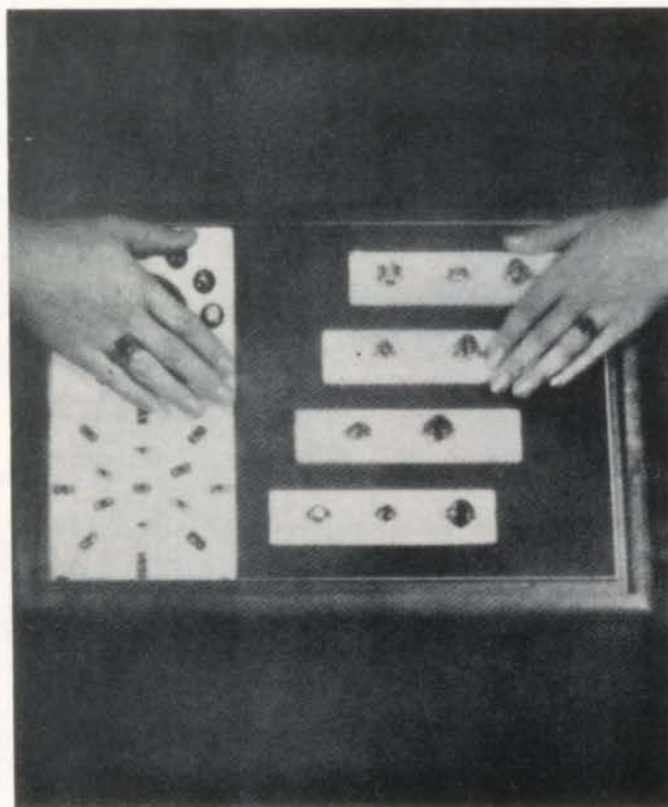


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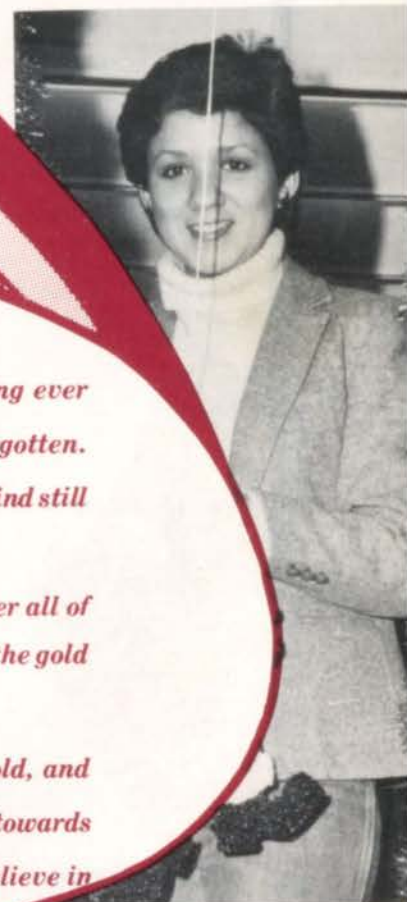
The Pot Of Gold

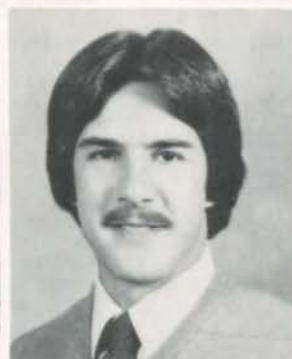


It's Almost Over!!
